Attached in Appendix 1 (to the report) is an overview of the recruitment costs (plus other incidental costs in relation to advertising, screenings and pre-employment medicals) for the previous two full financial years plus year to date.

The increase in recruitment costs in the 2017/18 financial year was due to the recruitment of a significant number of roles resulting from the 2017 organisational restructure. A decision was made in the 2018/19 financial year to reduce the reliance on full service recruitment agencies, resulting in a reduction in the recruitment costs to Council.

With regards to non-overhead/internal costs relating to recruitment, these costs are not captured against each recruitment assignment, however there is an associated significant investment of staff and management time. There are a number of variables which make it difficult to cost internal aspects of the recruitment process, such as:

- 1. The level of work conducted by agencies compared to internal resource requirements (which differs with each recruitment assignment/external agency service agreement) and;
- 2. Differing pay levels of employees on recruitment panels

ORIGINATING OFFICER COMMENTS:

The petition is in response to the expression of interest (EOI) process Council ran mid-2018 over the Marion Cultural Centre (MCC) site for an International Standard Hotel. Specifically it raises concerns with the potential demolition, relocation or closure of the existing MCC and requests that the existing MCC remain unchanged.

Council resolved on the 11 September 2018 (Reference Number GC180911) to not proceed any further with any of the submitted expressions of interest for a hotel at MCC site.

Council resolved on the 27 November 2018 (Reference Number GC181009) that:

1. Council guarantees the retention of the Current Marion Cultural Centre Building and its services.

However, council still has the ability to undertake any complementary renewal, enhancements and extensions (of the current Marion Cultural Centre) provided that this is undertaken with appropriate prior consultation with users and the community.

Administration consider that the above resolution adequately addresses the concerns raised in the petition. It



is impractical to resolve that the MCC must 'remain unchanged' indefinitely. The standing resolution protects the existing MCC while ensuring that inevitable complementary changes can occur in consultation with stakeholders.

An additional document of just names and suburbs was received at the same time as the above mentioned petition, however it did not comply with legislative requirements under the Local Government (Procedures at Meetings) Regulations 2013. The document did not include a statement of request or submission nor was it addressed to the Council, consequently it has not been included.

RECOMMENDATION:

DISCUSSION

At the 25 July 2017, General Council Meeting (GC250717R14), Council endorsed Bandon Terrace Reserve as a pilot application of the Natural Landscape Design and Maintenance Guideline (NLDMG):

That Council:

1. Endorses the pilot application of the Natural Landscapes Design and Maintenance Guideline as part of the Bandon Terrace Reserve development, with costings to be presented to Council as part of the design, for consideration in the 2018/19 budget;

At the 14 August 2018, General Council Meeting (GC180814R03), in endorsed the Implementation of the Natural Landscape Design and Maintenance Guidelines at Bandon Terrace Reserve:

That Council:

- 1. Endorses the draft concept plan for Bandon Terrace Reserve (Appendix 1) for consultation, detailed design and construction noting the plan reflects the Natural Landscape Design and Maintenance Guidelines.
- 2. Endorses the allocation of up to \$55,500 to implement the Natural Landscape Design and Maintenance Guidelines at Bandon Terrace Reserve, to be funded in 2018/19 through savings identified in the second 2018/19 Budget Review process.



3. Endorses an allocation of \$5,000 p.a. for the first five years for operating and maintenance and \$2,014 p.a. for renewal/depreciation for the Natural Landscape Design and Maintenance Guidelines at Bandon Terrace Reserve within the Long Term Financial Plan.

Carried Unanimously

CONSULTATION

Consultation on the proposed implementation of the NLDMG at Bandon Terrace Reserve was conducted over a 3 week period from 28 August 2018 to 18 September 2018. (Refer Appendix 6 for the outcomes of the consultation).

The purpose of the engagement was to inform the community members of the draft concept for a natural landscapes re-vegetation of Bandon Terrace Reserve and seek their feedback.

The survey was made available on line at www.makingmarion.com.au/bandon-terrace-reserve

The community were informed about the survey through the following means:

- A four-page information brochure (refer Appendix 2) was delivered to approximately 400 households (for map refer Appendix 3)
- A social media post was placed on the City of Marion Facebook page on 28 August 2018.
- Signage was placed on the site with information about the concept plan and where feedback can be provided. (refer Appendix 4 for map indicating sign locations)
- An email was sent to the 5049 Coastal Community (formerly Marino Residents Association) informing them of the consultation and the Association provided a link to the Making Marion consultation web page in their 'Community News Update' email newsletter on 7 September 2018.

In summary, over the three week consultation period Council received:

- A total of 24 visits were recorded between the 3 week period to the project's Making Marion webpage where survey tools including the Draft Concept and Precedent Images were available for viewing.
- 6 responses to the survey were received.
- 2 emails were received commenting on the project.

Of the 8 responses received:

- 4 of the 8 respondents supported the plan
- 1 suggested an alternative plant species to be considered
- 3 respondents were strongly unsupportive the plan, and raised specific concerns with regard to the planting of native grasses at the south eastern end of the reserve.

CURRENT AND FUTURE ON-SITE WORKS

Stormwater upgrades commenced January 2019, at the western end of the reserve, adjacent to Forrest Avenue, Marino. With works anticipated to be completed by the end of March 2019.

Residents directly impacted by the current stormwater works were advised of the impending work by the Contractor via a letter drop on 22 January 2019 .

Construction of the upgrade of the Bandon Terrace Reserve playground commenced mid March, it is anticipated works will be completed June 2019.



On site works for the implementation of the NLDMG has not yet commenced, these works are to be delivered in the coming months by a specialised contractor and will be tendered separately.

A map highlighting the work areas identified above is provided as Appendix 5.

REQUEST FOR A PUBLIC MEETING

The head petitioners have requested an on site meeting. Staff will coordinate a meeting at Bandon Terrace Reserve in early April to provide further feedback to the community on the implementation of the NLDMG.

RECOMMENDATION:

That Council:

- 1. Notes the petition
- 2. Advises the head petitioners that Council has noted the petition
- 3. Endorses the holding of a public meeting at Bandon Terrace Reserve in early April and advises the head petitioner this will occur
- 4. Notes a further report will be brought back to Council outlining the community feedback received at the site meeting.

Bandon Terrace Reserve Upgrade

Concept design and answers to frequently asked questions



Bandon Terrace Reserve is being upgraded to provide a pleasant, natural, and resilient landscape for everyone to enjoy into the future.

Council is investing up to \$275,000 on a new playground and shade sail at Bandon Terrace Reserve. A further \$55,500 will be invested in a revegetation plan to improve the biodiversity and amenity for the reserve.

Council will commence construction of a new playground in early 2019, which will include:

- New play equipment
- A new 3-on-3 basketball court, netball ring and cricket nets
- Kick-about space
- Shade sail
- A new BBQ and picnic setting

A concept design (refer plan inside) for the upgrade of the reserve's landscape includes the introduction of garden beds, native plants and grasses.

The garden beds will be located around the edge of the reserve and will be planted with flowering plants and low-lying native shrubs to provide colour and attract a diverse range of species to the reserve.

We will also re-grade and level the south-eastern grass area, as requested by the community during the consultation process for the playground in November 2017.

Landscape Concept Design – Provide your feedback

A survey will be available on the Making Marion website from Tuesday 28th August to Tuesday September 18th, 2018.

www.makingmarion.com.au/bandon-terrace-reserve

Feedback must be received by 5pm, 18 September 2018.

The outcomes of the consultation will be considered by Council before the concept is finalised.

The area will be re-seeded with native grass, which requires less irrigation and maintenance while allowing the community to enjoy the reserve as it is presently, with the added benefit of having more natural revegetated spaces which are adaptable to a changing climate.

It is anticipated that planting will occur between April and August 2019.



Bandon Terrace Landscape Treatment Plan

The concept plan below demonstrates the proposed landscape treatments on the reserve, including:

- Approximately 3000m² irrigated grass and garden around the playground and sports areas.
- Mulched garden beds planted with native plants and shrubs to provide colour and biodiversity to attract a diverse range of species to the reserve.
- Re-grading and levelling of the south-eastern turfed area.
- Native grassed area, irrigated through the establishment period and maintained short once established.



Key Benefits

- An increased presence of native flora will attract species such as butterflies, birds and lizards.
- The reserve will have an improved amenity and usability for both passive and active recreation.
- Increased opportunities for nature play and nature education.

- Opportunities for community to be involved through a planting day.
- Greater resilience to dry conditions.
- Improved water resource management.

Native grass – establishment process

The native grassed areas will be managed and maintained similar to the existing kikuyu and will continue to support active and passive recreation.

These grasses look and feel like other irrigated grass. The biggest difference is that it does not need to be mowed or watered as often once it has established.

Frequently Asked Questions Bandon Terrace Reserve Upgrade

Why are these changes occurring at Bandon Terrace Reserve?

In July 2017, Council endorsed a 'Natural Landscapes Design and Maintenance Guideline' to be implemented at the design phase of major reserve upgrades.

The playground at Bandon Terrace Reserve is being upgraded and it is proposed to implement the new landscaping at the same time.

The Council is progressively implementing these landscape changes to many of its reserves.

Close monitoring of the site will occur to determine if both the community and Council's expectations have been met.

How will the site be monitored?

Monitoring will be conducted on a quarterly basis, using visual inspections and photos of each plot taken at the same location.

Monitoring will involve reviewing the establishment, growth, weeds, required maintenance and appearance over time.

A database will be kept to record the results and any community feedback received will be an important resource.

Will the site be irrigated?

Approximately 3000m² of grass and garden beds around the playground will be irrigated.

Irrigation will be used on the south-eastern turf section for establishment purposes. Once the grasses are established, watering will occur during severe moisture stress.

How will the site be maintained?

The reserve will have a regular maintenance schedule which will include weeding, topping up of mulch, mowing and plant maintenance.

How high will the plants grow?

The new plantings within the mulched garden beds will be ground covers and small to medium plants and shrubs which will grow to maximum heights of approximately 30cm to 1m.

When will the reserve upgrade begin?

It is anticipated that construction will begin in early 2019.

How long will it take?

The upgrade will take approximately six months to install the playground, picnic facilities and landscaping.

The native grass area will take approximately nine months to establish to ensure the native grass is provided with the best conditions. It may need to be fenced during this time.

Will I still be able to walk my dog on the reserve?

During construction, much of the reserve will be fenced off. However, access to the western end of the reserve and the beach will remain open.

In order to let the native grass establish, the southeastern section of the reserve will be unavailable for approximately nine months while it establishes.

Once established, the reserve will be able to be used as it currently is, including walking dogs.

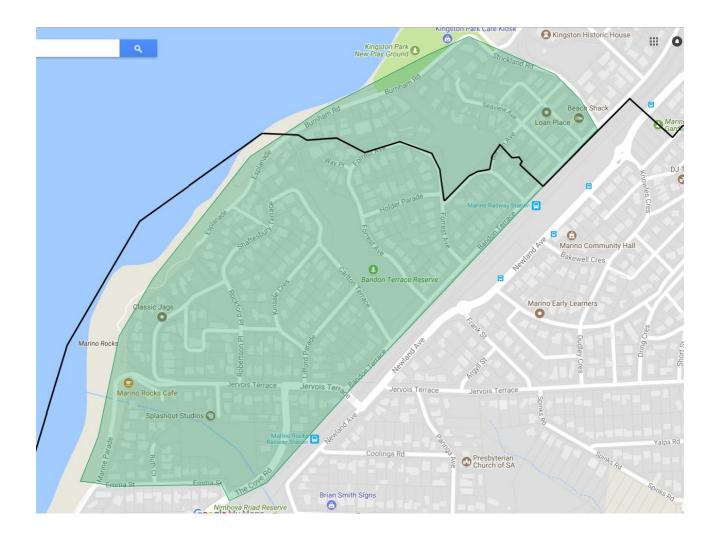

Findings of Draft Concept Community Consultation

September 2018

1. Introduction

This report summarises the community consultation undertaken on the draft concept plan for the implementation of the Natural Landscapes Design and Maintenance Guidelines and Bandon Terrace Reserve.

At the General Council meeting on 25 July 2017 Council adopted a Natural Landscapes Design and Maintenance Guideline to progressively implement as part of existing maintenance programs and at the design phase of major reserve upgrades.

At this meeting, Council also endorsed the pilot application of the Natural Landscapes Design and Maintenance Guideline as part of the Bandon Terrace Reserve development, with costings to be presented to Council as part of the design, for consideration in the 2018/19 budget.

A draft Natural Landscapes concept plan was then developed for implementation at Bandon Terrace Reserve which was presented to Council at the meeting on 14 August 2018.

Council endorsed the following recommendation:

Moved Councillor Crossland, Seconded Councillor Byram that Council:

1. Endorses the draft concept plan for Bandon Terrace Reserve (Appendix 1) for consultation, detailed design and construction noting the plan reflects the Natural Landscape Design and Maintenance Guidelines.

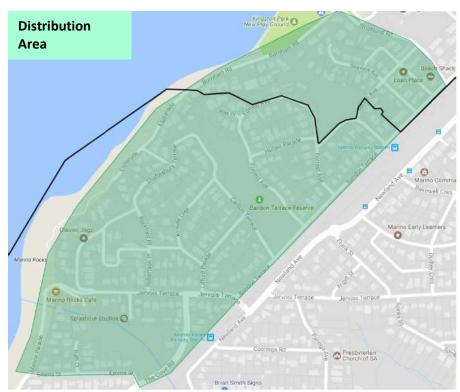
2. Consultation Program

The purpose of the engagement was to inform the community members of the draft concept for a natural landscapes re-vegetation of Bandon Terrace Reserve and seek their feedback. The consultation survey was open for 3 weeks from 28 August 2018 to 18 September 2018.

The survey was made available on line at www.makingmarion.com.au/bandon-terrace-reserve.

The community were informed about the survey in the following ways:

• A four-page information brochure was delivered to approximately 400 households within the area shown below:



- A social media post was placed on the City of Marion Facebook page on 28 August 2018.
- Signage was placed on the site with information about the concept plan and where feedback can be provided.
- An email was sent to the 5049 Coastal Community (formerly Marino Residents Association) informing them of the consultation and a message was included in their 'Community News Update' email newsletter with a link to the consultation web page.

3. Consultation Overview

Community members were invited through the online survey to provide feedback on the Natural Landscapes draft concept plan for Bandon Terrace Reserve.

As a summary, during this 3-week consultation period Council received:

6 electronic responses from Making Marion.

A full summary of all responses to each question is provided within this report. Responses have been listed as worded by the respondent and all have been submitted anonymously.

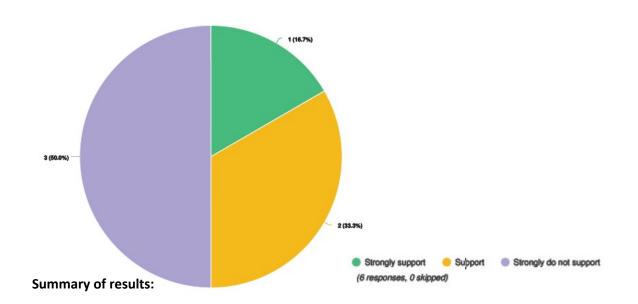
4. Overview of Consultation Findings

In summary, over the three week consultation period Council received:

- A total of 24 visits were recorded between the 3 week period to the project's Making Marion web
 page where survey tools including the Draft Concept and Precedent Images were available for
 viewing.
- 6 responses to the survey were received.
- 2 emails were received commenting on the project.
- Of the 8 responses received
 - 4 of the 8 respondents supported the plan
 - 1 suggested an alternative plant species to be considered
 - 3 respondents were strongly unsupportive the plan, and raised specific concerns with regard to the planting of native grasses at the south eastern end of the reserve

5. Summary of feedback received

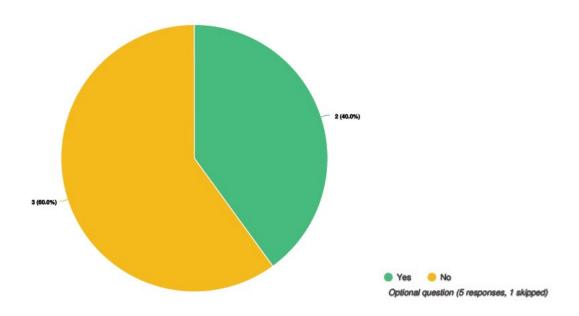
Q1 Overall, what do you think of the plan?



The pie chart above illustrates that half of respondents are in support of the draft concept and the other half are not in support with:

- 3 of the 6 respondents were strongly unsupportive of the proposed draft concept
- 2 respondents supportive of the proposed draft concept
- 1 respondent strongly supportive of the proposed draft concept.

Q2. Would you be interested in being involved in a community planting day?



Summary of results:

Of the 6 respondents, 3 indicated that they were not interested in attending a community planting event and 2 indicated that they would be interested.

Q3. What comments would you like to make about the plan?

Summary of results:

All 6 respondents provided comments about the concept plan. Responses have been listed as worded by the respondent.

- I think there's too much focus on native planting in Marino/Kingston aiming for the older demographic. How about we think about the younger families. This is just asking for more snakes.
- TOILETS. Playgrounds must have toilet facilities. I have not seen any information where toilets are planned for this area.
- Beautiful location need to consider older kids and young adult needs. le bike track and sports training.

- I support the upgrade of the playground and additional garden beds and would like to request the addition of some footy goals to utilize. I feel strongly that the seeding of native grasses is a mistake at the bandon tce end. This area gets plenty of use as a green space and although is very uneven it is pleasant to kick footy or play with dog etc. this is the only section of the plan where limited detail has been provided. Native grasses will be extremely hard to grow amongst kikuyu unless the kikuyu is sprayed out prior to seeding- will this occur? What species of native grass will be used? This area will only be used if it is pleasant to play on or walk through. For the grass cover to stay health and self seed it will need to be allowed to set seed. No one will want to use this area with knee high grass. In the document it states native grass requires less water and maintenance- that sounds more like a cost cutting excercise that providing the community with a pleasant area to use. Native grasses will still require watering and maintenance to look and feel nice- you could argue as much as low maintenance kikuyu that is now. More weed control will be needed here as native grasses will not compete with broadleaf weeds like kikuyu does. Please don't let this area go, maintain it as a watered and maintained grass area as it is now where it can be used. Tell the community where this has occurred successfully so we can compare and see what to expect. I suspect there isn't anywhere that would be better than what we have now. Please keep the grass and perhaps even level out the area for better functionality.
- Bandon Terrace Reserve is looking very nice today, as it is. I attended at the reserve some months
 ago when there was some consultation and the majority of people there seemed to prefer the
 park to be left as it is. The small playground is used sometimes and seems adequate. Really, if
 Marion Council has so much surplus money, and perhaps surplus staff, that they can think up new
 projects I would suggest that they cut our rates.
- I am extremely concerned about the revised plantings proposed. The proposed amount of traditional (and hardy) grass to be irrigated is no more than about 5x house blocks in area. Currently most of the recreation area is covered by kikuyu and there is NO grass as resilient to dry spells than it. It provides much needed fresh colour and is re-invigorated after either minimal showers or occasional watering (it is currently over watered by council in summer.) The worst area for us and visually ugly is the northern or ocean end which is full of weeds that dry off in spring allowing for brown soil to turn to dust that affects our health. It would be far more valuable to have that large area covered in native plantings for better use by native species as it would be a large area less intrusive of people. It would also be a far more attractive area to wonder through or admire in summer which is currently a most ugly area that people walk past when going to the sea which a lot of people do. I put it to you that this weed infested area promotes the spread of weeds already noticeably travelling to the southern currently grassed area. This would be increased within the native grassed areas/beds proposed.

The area proposed to be levelled in the southern most part of Bandon Tce reserve will work potentially, provided it is cut regularly or it will be to long or grass too uneven to run or play on. As I have indicated, the strength and durability of kikuyu in South Australia's climate is hard to beat. I have been involved in oval maintenance and cannot envisage the native grass proposed looking as cool a green (a relief to appreciate on summer days) nor be as effective overall. If the council is so confident on the effect it would be very useful to provide us ratepayers of an example of where this has worked before embarking on this costly and questionable radical change to a beautiful park which I suspect is to primarily save on water costs which I think could be better managed anyway.

I live in close proximity to this reserve and so have an intimate appreciation of how it all works. We appreciate the consultation already offered (and listened to and acted upon by planners) regarding the proposed update of the play area and would hope that you listen to us on this issue as well. Residents mentioned the desire and benefits of vegetating the northern end but no information was given of these park vegetation changes proposed by council planners at the time. I hope you will consider my feedback when finalising your plans.

5. Feedback received by email/website

The following comments were received through email and Council's website feedback form:

- Regarding the examples of plants to be used may I recommend not to plant Acacia as the blossom can cause allergic reaction in some children.
- I was unable to access the "consultation" page regarding the refurbished Bandon Terrace playground equipment due to a "404" error. We visited the Angus Neill reserve on the Esplanade recently and think that this is a good example to follow. Sandpit, climbing wall, cave and posts etc are excellent for kids. I note there is no plan for toilets and believe this to be essential given that the closest are several kms away. I trust that you are able to incorporate some of these features.

6. Social Media Post

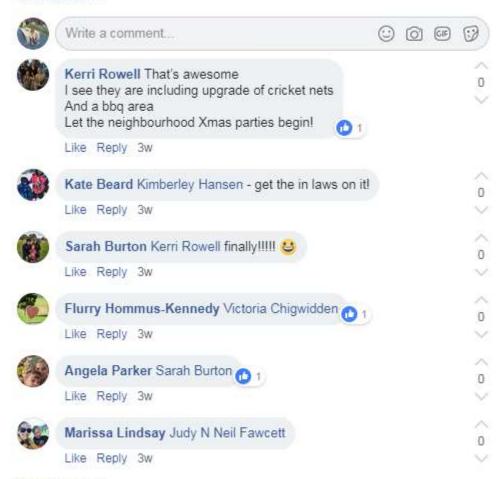

We have recently moved to the area, purchasing a house near the park, to allow our kids the freedom to run/play there. Whilst we were made aware and were happy about the upgrade to the play area, we were never informed of the removal of the lawn from the Eastern side of the park.

This is of concern to us as a family, who's son's regularly play ball games, or sit under the shade of the trees with friends. Our family visit often with their dog and we regularly use the lawn for picnics. The play area, currently being upgraded, will be lovely, however, we feel it will not provide enough lawn space to allow lots of kids to kick a ball around, if there are younger children playing, or people walking dogs on what will remain of the grassed area after the upgrade.

Having gone onto the Marion Council website, to understand more about this matter, I am somewhat concerned about, what seem to be revised plans. The 1st part of the plans and research amongst local residents related to the upgrade of the play area (this was 2017). The 2nd part of the plan, which seems to be 2018, related to "a further \$55 500, which will be invested in a revegetation plan…" As a resident during 2018, I certainly was not made aware, or communicated with about this additional investment and additional changes to the reserve.

I understand, from speaking to neighbours, visitors to the park and friends in the area, that many people are concerned about these plans, which they too do not seem to be aware of. I would appreciate it if the Council could engage with the community to discuss these concerns and address the local petition which was recently submitted.

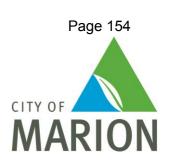

6:34 pm Hallett Cove Sea Pool Technical Feasibility Study - Feedback and Discussion (Report Reference: ISC190305R03)

6.34 pm Senior Environmental Planner and Water Research Engineer from University of NSW entered the meeting to provide an update on the progress of the Hallett Cove Sea Pool Feasibility Study.

The following is a summary of the discussion:

- Presentation included advantages, limitations, pool types, sea level rise / tidal conditions, wave overtopping of pool walls, safety considerations, lifecycle expectations, maintenance, usage estimates, water quality.
- Estimated costs and lifecycle, initial capital, refurbishment and maintenance costs.
- Embankment protection stepped concrete wall shown as an example.
- Potential pool size has been based on best practice and feedback from other community areas indicate that is what works well for ocean pools.
- The ocean are generally unfenced. Fencing is only used for the few pools that charge admission.
- Lifeguards were discussed. In NSW some pools use lifeguards depending on the popularity of the pool. Further advice on the need for lifeguards at a pool in Hallett Cove would need to be sought.
- In severe weather events, signage is used to close the pool.
- Location selected due to shelter from headland, winter sun, access to the pool. Cost to relocate stormwater relatively minor versus having the pool in the right location.
- Ecological and coastal heritage study includes the whole Heron Way embankment.
- Car parking studies are underway but further consideration would be needed with the existing Boatshed Café, coastal boardwalk and recreational users.
- Only at the feasibility study stage at this point and no detailed design has been considered. It is a State Government project that we are assisting with.

REPORT OBJECTIVE

The report objective:

Seek Council endorsement to discontinue the planning of a joint school and community use facility at Seaview High School due to the significantly higher project costs.

Seek Council endorsement to undertake further investigations of the renewal of 4 courts at the Tarnham Road site and explore options to utilise the remaining land to address an under supply of open space within the area.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

At the 14 August 2018 General Council meeting Council resolved the following items to progress the planning for the Seaview High School Sport Facilities Partnership: GC140814R02

- 1. Endorses Option 1 for the proposed redevelopment of the courts at Seaview High and to build a multi-purpose clubroom to support community use of the courts and playing fields.
- 2. That consideration be given to undertaking this option in two stages. Stage 1 including the tennis and netball courts, lighting and associated retaining. Stage 2 being the clubrooms.
- 3. Endorses an allocation of up to \$37,000 for the development a concept design and cost estimates for the preferred option, to be funded in 2018/19 through the budget review process.
- 4. Notes Seaview High School's contribution of \$37,000 towards the development of a concept design and cost estimates to redevelop the courts and a clubroom.
- 5. Request a report will be provided to Council in February 2019 on the concept design, cost estimates, funding options and School Access Agreement.

A costed concept design has been developed in accordance with Council's 14 August 2018 resolution which includes redeveloped courts with lighting, car parking, landscaping and a larger clubroom that is compliant with AFL Preferred Facility Guidelines. The project has been costed in the order of \$3.2M which is \$1.2M above the original budget estimate of \$2M.

Council in considering its financial contribution needs to consider the return to the community. Key factors to consider include:

- Community access to the facilities is limited outside of school hours ie. weekdays after 4pm and Saturday and Sunday.
- The facility will not be the home to a specific club but will rather address overflow needs of the Dover Gardens Tennis Club and other field sports currently hiring from the school.
- The school ovals do not have lights which further restricts community and club use.



As a result of the investigations and preliminary design undertaken it is recommended Council cease exploring the development of a joint school and community use facility at Seaview High School due to the significantly high project cost and limited access to the community.

It is recommended that Council undertakes further investigations of the renewal of 4 courts at the Tarnham Road site and as part of these investigations Council also seeks to utilises the Tarnham Road site to address an under supply of open space within the area.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council

- 1. Endorses to cease exploring the development of a joint school and community use facility at Seaview High School due to the significantly higher project costs.
- 2. Requires Administration to write to the Principal of Seaview High School to thank the school for the cooperation and good will towards the planning of a shared sports and community facility.
- 3. Undertakes further investigations of the renewal of 4 courts at the Tarnham Road site and seeks to utilise the remaining land at Tarnham Road site to address an under supply of open space within the surrounding area.
- 4. Notes that a further report be brought to Council in May 2019 identifying budget requirements for the redevelopment of Tarnham Road Reserve.

GENERAL ANALYSIS

Liveable: This project supports Council's objective to make services, facilities and

open spaces more accessible

TimelineBudget for the redevelopment of Tarnham Road Reserve to be included in

the 2019/20 annual business plan and budget.

DISCUSSION

The initial focus of this project was developing a shared use facility to meet the needs of Seaview High school and Dover Square Tennis Club. This was documented in Council's tennis and netball review in February 2017 (GC280217R06)

Through discussion with the school and sporting organisations it was recognised the school site offered greater potential for community and club use.

At the 14 August 2018 General Council meeting Council resolved the following items to progress the planning for the Seaview High School Sport Facilities Partnership: GC140814R02

1. Endorses Option 1 for the proposed redevelopment of the courts at Seaview High and to build a multi-purpose clubroom to support community use of the courts and playing fields.

That consideration be given to undertaking this option in two stages. Stage 1 including the tennis and netball courts, lighting and associated retaining. Stage 2 being the clubrooms.

2. Endorses an allocation of up to \$37,000 for the development a concept design and cost estimates



for the preferred option, to be funded in 2018/19 through the budget review process.

- 3. Notes Seaview High School's contribution of \$37,000 towards the development of a concept design and cost estimates to redevelop the courts and a clubroom.
- 4. Request a report will be provided to Council in February 2019 on the concept design, cost estimates, funding options and School Access Agreement.

A concept design (attachment 1) has been developed which includes:

- 1. New amenities building compliant with AFL Preferred Facility Guidelines that includes a social/meeting area that also meets DECD requirements for a class room. The building is intended to be multi-purpose and support community and school use of the school ovals and playing fields as well as the new courts to be constructed.
- 2. 6 New outdoor courts (4 Tennis and 2 Multipurpose tennis and netball courts) with lighting
- 3. Car parking linked to the building providing disability access
- 4. Landscaping of surrounds

The design process has been led by DPTI which is a requirement for facilities developed on DECD land. The process lead to the inclusion of a number of additional items since the original cost estimate was presented to Council in August 2018.

These additional items include

- 1. Additional toilets to meet the requirements for children's safety i.e. separate male female disability toilets to cater for children and spectators.
- 2. Contamination Risk: A risk allowance has made for the disposal of intermediate waste fill that currently exists beneath the existing tennis court surface.
- 3. Viewing shelters to the courts
- 4. Exposed Aggregate Pavers in the highly visible and heavily used public terrace area
- 5. The timber decking to the north east corner assists in dealing with the level difference beyond the soccer pitch by providing a continual flat level
- 6. The eastern canopy extension by an additional 35m2 provides undercover weather protection for visitors watching the games on the soccer and football fields
- 7. Detention Tank for Stormwater. A 17,000L stormwater above ground detention tank is required to meet the Marion/ Holdfast Bay Stormwater Management Plan

Discussion of lights on the playing fields also raised concerns about potential over use of the oval so concept design does not include lights for the ovals and soccer pitch. Without lights potential community use will be restricted to 4pm to 6pm Mondays to Fridays and limit the benefit to clubs. The playing fields would be available all day Saturday and Sunday.

If developed the school facilities will not be the home to a specific club but will rather address overflow needs of the Dover Gardens Tennis Club and other field sports currently hiring from the school.

The project has been costed at \$3.2M which is \$ 1.2M above the original budget estimate of \$1.9M. Council should refer to the confidential report which provides detailed cost estimate for the project.

As a result of the investigations and preliminary design undertaken it is recommended Council cease exploring the development of a joint school and community use facility at Seaview High School due to the significantly higher project costs.

Tarnham Road Reserve

In the region between Sturt Road and Majors Road there is limitedaccess to outdoor courts. There are eight courts at Tarnham Road and two multi-purpose courts at Sandery Street Reserve. It is therefore important some of the courts are retained at Tarnham Road Reserve.



The Tarnham Road Reserve is classified as a Local Open Space. The open space percentage in Seacombe Heights and Darlington is 5%, and Tarnham Road Reserve is the only reserve in the northern part of the suburb that provides open space in a dense housing area.

A geotechnical report for the site indicates the four courts at the eastern end of the complex have a fair surface condition and a re-surfacing to restore shape and serviceability to the tennis courts is expected to be a suitable upgrade option. However the investigations also indicated the presence of an old septic tank under the sub-base of 3 courts to the western end of the complex and full reconstruction of those courts and sub-base would be required. A summary of the geotechnical analysis is included in attachment 2.

The Dover Square Tennis Club advised that due to the poor condition of the playing surface the courts are no longer fit for competition tennis. On the 4 June 2018, the tennis club officially advised Council that they would not apply to extend the lease of the property at Tarnham Road, Seacombe Heights past June 30, 2018. The Club is currently using alternative courts until a solution for Tarnham Road Reserve is available.

The Dover Square Tennis Club has indicted they are keen to work closely with the City of Marion to assist with the proposed rejuvenation of the facilities.

It is recommended Council considers retaining and upgrading the four courts at the eastern end of the complex to meet the needs of club and community access to courts. The four western courts could be removed and utilise the remaining land to address an under supply of open space within the within the area.

Tarnham Road Courts have existing floodlights. Seaview High School made a financial contribution towards the installation of these lights.

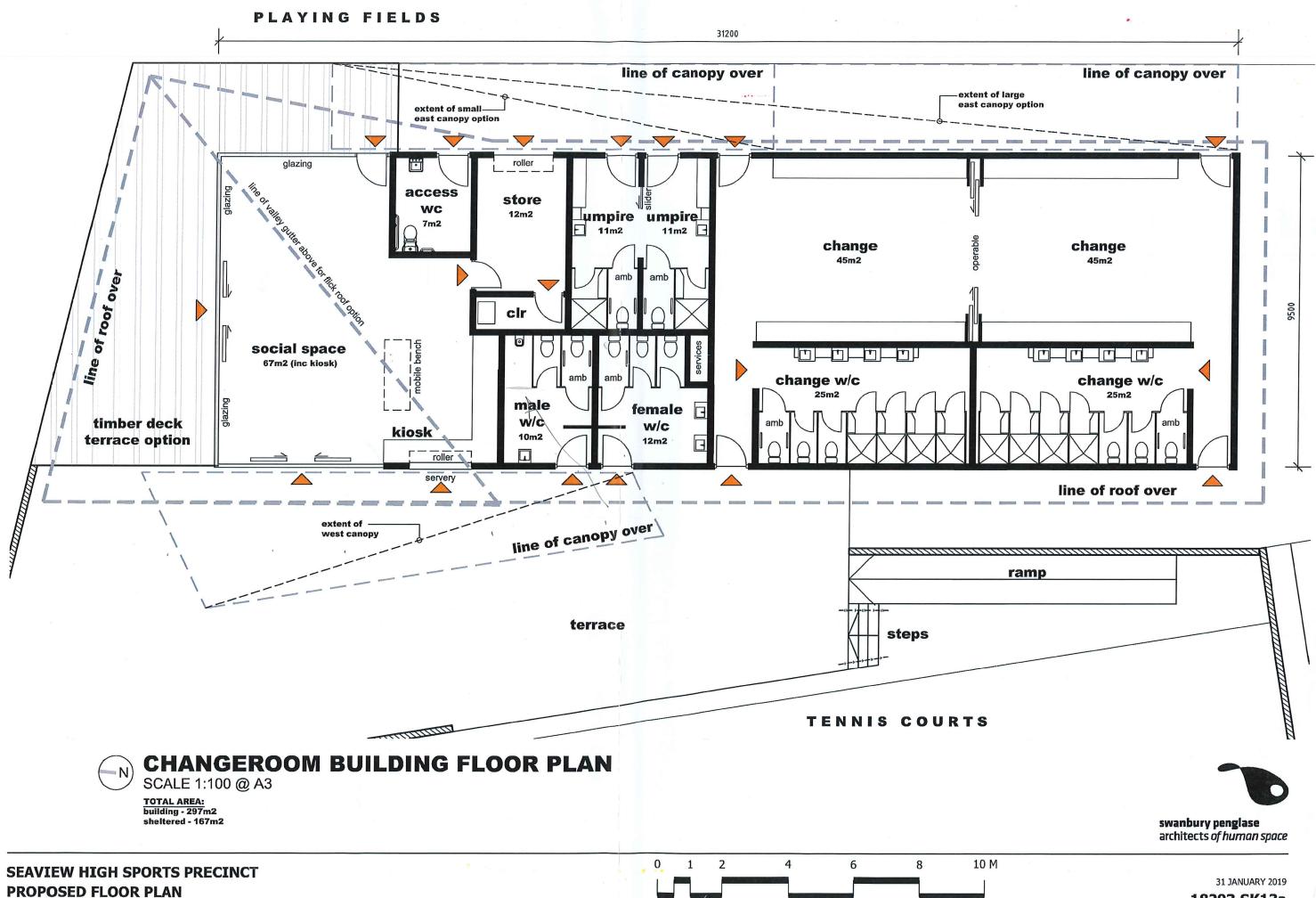
Finance

To date \$14,000 of Council's allocation of \$37,000 for design has been used leaving \$23,000 available for further investigations into Tarnham Road reserve.

A subsequent report will be drafted for Council identifying budget requirements for the redevelopment of the courts and reserve in May 2019.

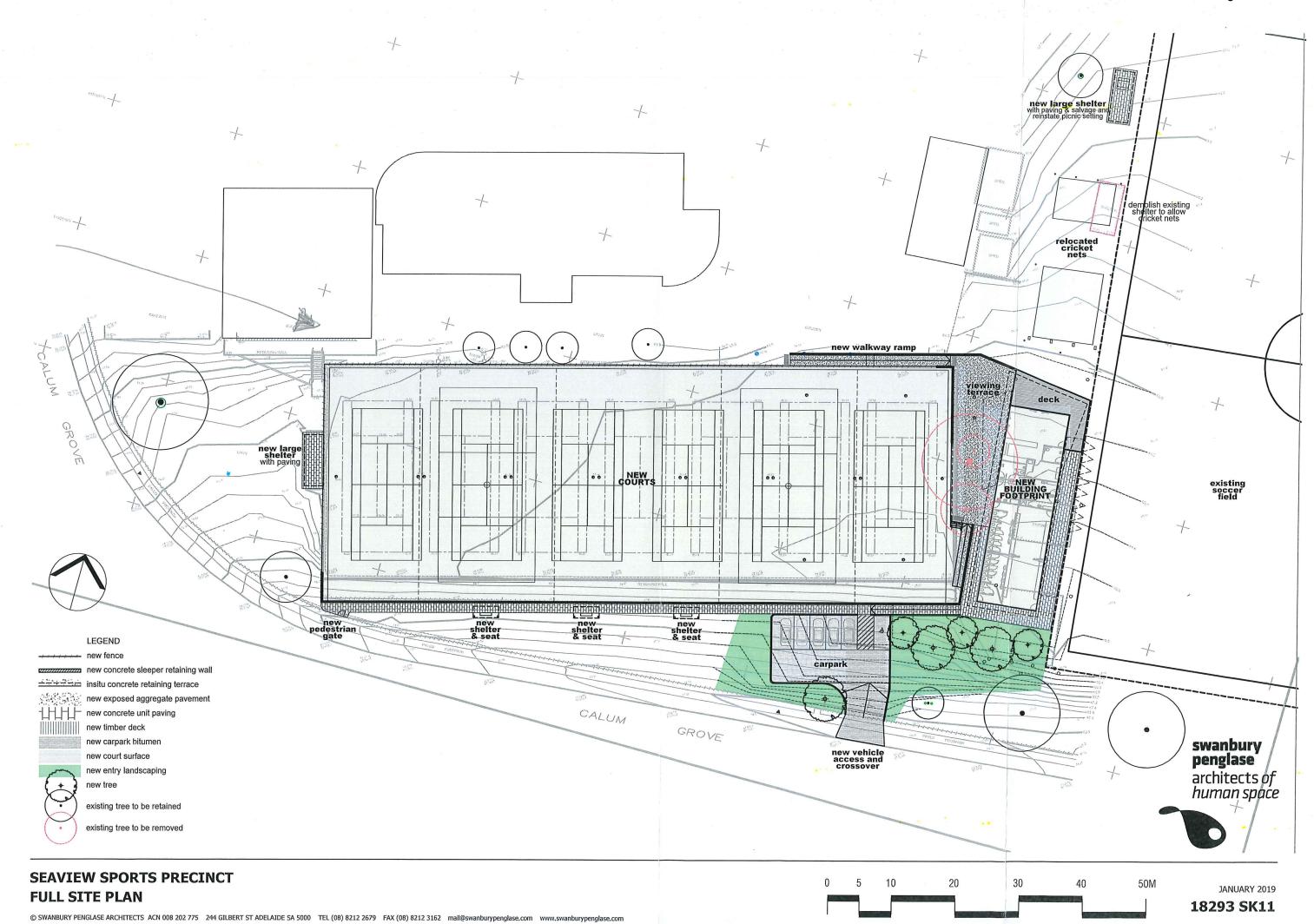

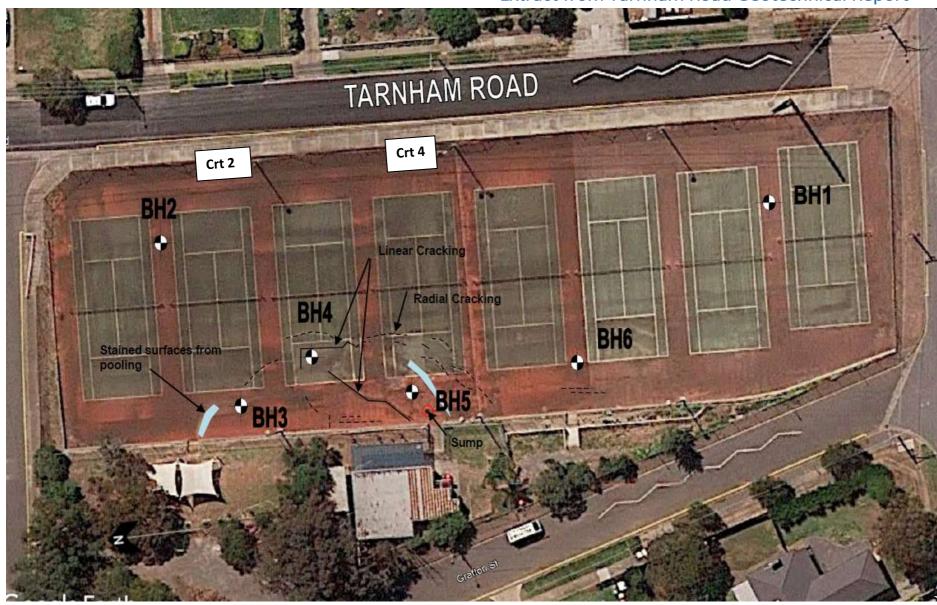

Extract from Tarnham Road Geotechnical Report

Upgrade Options

Due to the fair surface condition across the majority of the tennis courts, a re-surfacing to restore shape and serviceability to the tennis courts is generally expected to be a suitable upgrade option. In such areas it is suggested that a minimum plane and reinstate (P&R) construction comprising a minimum of 50 mm thickness of asphaltic concrete is provided.

In the area of distress around the southern portion of courts 2 to 4, full reconstruction of the tennis court pavement is recommended due to the presence of deformed and cracked pavements and a relatively poorly constructed pavement profile in parts which appears to be contributing to the distress. The extent of full reconstruction would depend on the extent of the poor pavement construction and presence of fill (if encountered) at the time of construction, but could reasonably be expected to cover the current extent of radial distress, with an additional 2 m wide transitional zone.

- Extranet information
- Two Facebook posts
- Printed copies at all Neighbourhood Centres, Libraries and the Administration Centre



- Email distribution to internal databases to stakeholders including approximately:
 - 250 Arts and Cultural databases
 - 235 Volunteer databases
 - 80 school contacts, youth organisations and youth networks

Engagement outcomes

- 88 people viewed the Making Marion website:
 - 1 person completed the Poll, supporting the Policy
 - 1 comment was received, not related to the Policy
- 21 people downloaded the document
- Facebook posts received 7 likes and 3 shares

The results confirm that the community were aware of the proposed Policy and Procedure and were provided with the opportunity to give feedback.

Draft Public Consultation Policy



1. RATIONALE

The City of Marion acknowledges that people want to have a say about decisions that affect their lives. Better decisions are made when the decision-maker takes into account the knowledge, experience and opinions of those affected by the decision.

According to The City of Marion's Strategic Plan Towards 2040 we will strive to make every decision with integrity and in the best interests of our community.

2. POLICY STATEMENT

This Policy sets out the City of Marion's commitment to effective community engagement regarding Council decisions which have an impact on the people who live, work, study, conduct business and use the facilities or public places in the City of Marion. We seek to communicate effectively with our community about: decision-making processes; the factors, resources and objectives relevant to the decisions we make; and the decisions themselves.

This policy will:

- Guide effective engagement between Council and the communities
- Promote positive relations and develop ongoing mutually beneficial relationships
- Provide ongoing opportunities for participatory decision making
- Support Council leadership where decision-making style is open, transparent, responsive, inclusive and accountable to the community.

3. OBJECTIVES

Elected Members are acknowledged as the representatives of community and empowered to make decisions. The role of staff is to present to the Elected Members all facts (which may include community perspectives) relevant to Council decisions, and subsequently to implement the decisions of Council.

We communicate openly and honestly about the degree of influence communities are able to exercise in any engagement activity or key decision.

We value the diversity of our communities and will utilise inclusive, representative and accessible approaches.

We commit to evaluation and continuous improvement in our community engagement. We will commit to appropriate levels of community engagement before making significant decisions taking into account the number of people affected and the likely degree of impact of the decision.

 Empower – Placing the decision-making about specific projects in the hands of the community. The community takes responsibility and is accountable for the outcomes of decisions made.

4. POLICY SCOPE AND IMPLEMENTATION

The policy applies to the way we engage our communities in decisions and communicate decisions of the organisation. The policy applies to council members, council employees, contractors and consultants acting on behalf of Council.

5. PUBLIC CONSULTATION REQUIREMENTS

The City of Marion Public Consultation Procedure sets out:

- Matters requiring legislated public consultation in accordance with the Local Government Act 1999.
- Further matters requiring public consultation including any requirements for newspaper notices, written or online submissions or opportunities for attendances at public meetings.
- Engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples under Council's Reconciliation Action Plan 2016-2019.
- A process for any other discretionary public consultation.

Public Consultation Procedure



1. RATIONALE

The purpose of this procedure is guide staff about how to fulfil the Council's statutory obligations under section 50 of the Local Government Act 1999 (the Act) in relation to public consultation (community engagement).

2. PROCEDURE SCOPE AND IMPLEMENTATION

This policy will apply to public consultation processes required or undertaken under the Act and engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples under Council's Reconciliation Action Plan 2016-2019

3. LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT 1999 REQUIREMENTS

Chapter 2 of the Act outlines principles to be observed by a council, which include to provide open, responsive and accountable government.

More particularly, section 50 of the Act requires that a council must prepare and adopt a public consultation policy, which may be altered from time to time or substituted with a new policy.

Elsewhere, the Act makes reference to public consultation in various sections. In some cases, the Act prescribes that public consultation be undertaken in accordance with the minimum requirements of the Act. Refer Part 1 below.

In other cases, the Act prescribes that public consultation be undertaken in accordance with Council's public consultation policy. Refer Part 2 below.

In other cases, the Act does not require that public consultation be undertaken.

Part 3: Additional public consultation at the Council's discretion

For matters that fall under Part 1 or Part 2 of this Policy, and in relation to other Council decisions made in accordance with the Act where the Act does not require public consultation, Council may, on a case-by-case basis, determine in its absolute discretion to undertake consultation over and above the minimum requirements of the Act.

In these situations, it will be a matter for the Council to approve additional or discretionary consultation steps based on the internal engagement framework.

For the avoidance of doubt, there is no obligation on the Council or CEO to undertake, or to consider whether or not to undertake, any additional or discretionary consultation steps.

REPORT OBJECTIVE

To present to Council a proposed program of works that outlines the Oaklands Crossing \$4 million funding agreement commitments 2019-22 and Oaklands Smart Precinct - Smart Cities and Suburbs additional funding (\$710,650) integration. The program considers capital and operational budgets in alignment to deliverable scopes of work and Council's financial year contributions and grant funding acquittal time frames. A concept plan is presented illustrating the Oaklands Smart Precinct pedestrian / cyclist connection from the new station to the regional centre with an integrated community park.

Endorsement is sought for the following:

- The proposed works program scope, design budgets and deliverable time lines.
- Community engagement on Dwyer Road Reserve upgrade and community connection to the Regional Centre.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Council are a funding partner for the Oaklands Crossing Project. In accordance to the funding agreement Council has contributed \$1 million direct (2018/19) to the enhancement of public realm works within the DPTI contracted scope and an additional \$4 million of supporting public realm infrastructure over three financial years (2019/20-2021/22).

In addition, the City of Marion has been successful in the Australian Government "Smart Cities and Suburbs" grant funding. The Oaklands Smart Precinct will enhance the local community, visitor and commuter experience through increased connectivity and liveability. The grant provides an additional \$710,650 to invest in smart technology infrastructure within the precinct.

A proposed program of capital works outlining Council's contributing \$4 million and integration of Smart Cities and Suburbs grant funding has been developed. The scope of works presented supports pedestrian and cyclist connectivity to the new station, reinforcing the aim to increase public transport patronage. The program considers the terms of the funding agreement, grant funding acquittal time frames, practicality of works and resource requirements

The following scope and design budgets have been identified;

- Diagonal Way and Diagonal Road community connection to the Regional Centre which comprises
 of Marion Cultural Centre, South Australian Aquatic and Leisure Centre (SAALC), GP Plus, Services
 SA and further south to Westfield.
- Dwyer Road Reserve community park (maximising open space)
- Railway Terrace northern verge pavement and amenity treatments adjacent the local shops, supporting activation and connectivity to the station.
- Crozier Terrace eastern verge connecting Kearnes Road to Dwyer Road
- Murray Terrace northern verge connecting Morphett Road to Barry Terrace
- Addison Avenue southern verge connecting Morphett Road to Ailsa Avenue



RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

- 1. Endorses the proposed works program scope, scheduling and design budgets.
- 2. Endorses the concept plan for Diagonal Way road closure and Dwyer Road Reserve to be consulted with the community in April 2019.
- 3. Notes a future report will be presented to Council, informing of consultation findings on the concept plan for the Diagonal Way road closure and Dwyer Road Reserve development.
- 4. Authorises a letter be sent to the Highways Commissioner seeking written approval to commence the road closure process as per Section 26(8) of the Highways Act.
- 5. Notes a future report will be presented to Council, seeking authorisation to commence the Roads (Opening and Closing Act, 1991) process to close the section of Diagonal Way, Oaklands Park; between the northern boundary of 10 Diagonal Way and the southern boundary of the intersection of Crozier Terrace and Dwyer Road to facilitate the development and expansion of Dwyer Road Reserve.

GENERAL ANALYSIS

The Public Transport Projects Alliance (PTPA) have completed designs for the Oaklands Crossing. Construction is well under way with rail occupation programmed for April/ May 2019. The new station will be operational from early May 2019. Works to decommission the existing station, landscape treatments, construction of off-street car parking on Murray and Railway Terrace are to follow. Estimated completion of works is August 2019. PTPA scope of works are illustrated in Attachment 1.

Council staff have assessed the PTPA deliverable scope and investigated opportunities for enhancement to adjacent pedestrian, cyclist connections that supports accessibility, wayfinding and amenity to key destinations in the locality. The scope has integrated the Smart Cities and Suburbs grant, providing a unique opportunity to create a precinct, which enhances the community and visitor experience.

The program of works represents capital works design budgets estimated at a high level. The design budgets have then been used to model a practical approach to delivery, reflective of the funding agreement financial year commitments, Smart Cities and Suburbs grant funding acquittals and project management practicalities of planning and implementation.

The proposed scope and objectives are summarised in Attachment 2 and concept plans illustrated in Attachment 3.

Liveable

Council's contributing funds will enhance community safety and social and cultural wellbeing through improvements to public realm infrastructure. Pathways and landscape elements such as street trees, furniture and wayfinding will support active transportation within the precinct. Furthermore, data capture through smart sensor integration will aid service provision planning within the precinct.

Valuing Nature

The creation of a larger community park at Dwyer Road Reserve in addition to other streetscape and public realm improvements will enhance the environmental qualities of the precinct.

Connected

Improved connections between the Oaklands Station, surrounding suburbs and Marion Regional Centre in addition to smart technological applications will enhance connectivity and engagement of the community and visitors.



Prosperous

The proposed works program will enhance public spaces and improve connections between the Oaklands Station, local destinations and Marion Regional Centre. Urban activation initiatives to Railway Terrace will support the local shops.

The City of Marion has recently received a grant from Adelaide University School of Architecture and Built Environment to participate in a community engagement, planning and design program. The programs initiatives are for students to engage in a place activation strategy for a locality, developing on the ground interventions that will support community engagement in the public realm. The University will be contributing \$10,000 to the program. Council's project team will assess designs for integration, suitability and practicality with appropriate due diligence as per the Urban Activation program recently administered.

Innovation

The first Smart Precinct in South Australia will deliver enhanced infrastructure and service provisions to the local and visitor economy. The Oaklands precinct will model a scalable and replicable approach for other precincts throughout the City. The smart precinct will enhance the local community and visitor experience by supporting efficiencies in the transportation network, interactive play technology and data capture and analysis for future service provisions and planning.

Consultation

PTPA has temporarily closed the proposed section of Diagonal Way to facilitate a site construction compounc (Section 26 Highways Act, 1926). This has provided a trial of vehicle circulation through the local street network and effects on neighbouring residents to be assessed. The PTPA have conducted door knocks during the construction program to evaluate the community's views on the temporary road closure of Diagonal Way. The PTPA survey data illustrates a level of support for the permanent closure of the section of road proposed in the concept plans. Refer to Attachment 6.

Consultation on the community connection and Dwyer Road Reserve concept is planned to comprise an online survey requesting feedback on the proposed road closure and open space development of Dwyer Road Reserve and Morphett Road Reserve. A draft brochure for community engagement is attached. Refer Attachment 7.

In addition to the online survey, a public engagement session is planned for 10th April 2019 (location to be confirmed). The session will be hosted prior to the rail occupation period (13th April- 6th May) to maximise community participation. The session will enable the community to ask questions and to provide comments, which will inform the open space and public realm development. This also provides an opportunity to begin engagement with the community on smart cities and what this means. Consultation will be facilitated by staff in Open Space and Recreation Planning, City Activation, Smarts Cities Project Officer and Communications.

Additional Resource Impact

The program of works capitalises the costs of design professional services and project management as per the funding agreement. Consultants are engaged for 30% design services for Diagonal Way and Diagonal Road community connection to ensure integration with the station. Council's City Activation Senior Advisor will project manage this component of the project.

Detailed design for Diagonal Way, Dwyer Road Reserve and Morphett Road Reserve will be by consultants to ensure smart technology integration. Council's City Activation Senior Advisor will project manage the design process with support from Engineering, Open Space and Recreation team and Smart Cities Project Officer. Procurement and construction administration will be by internal resources.

Design and delivery programming of Diagonal Road, Railway Terrace, Addison Avenue, Murray Terrace and Crozier Terrace verge treatments, will be administered by Council's Engineering Business Unit within existing resources.

The smart cities grant includes fees for the engagement of technical experts for various data and technical solutions. These services will be procured through a tender process as per Councils procurement policy. Project management of the smart cities grant will be managed through the Smart Cities Project Officer role.



Current Budget Allocation

Total funding for the Oaklands Precinct works program is \$4,710,650 comprising of;

Oaklands Crossing funding agreement (\$4 million) has been allocated over the following financial years \$900,000 (2019/20); \$1,550,000 (2020/21); \$1,550,000 (2021/22). As per GC280818R05, this is to be funded through existing capital works budgets.

- The Smart Cities and Suburbs Grant for Oaklands Precinct Infrastructure is \$710,650, based on a 50/50 contribution, which is allocated within the \$4 million.
- Note the total Smart Cities and Suburbs Grant of \$867,500 includes \$156,850 contributing to Smart South Consortium and Metrics that Matter data platform infrastructure that is outside of the Oaklands project scope.
- Delivery of the Smart Cities grant fund program by June 2020. Council staff will monitor the design program and communicate with the funding body on project progress.

DISCUSSION

The Oaklands Crossing grade separation and new station is being jointly funded by the Australian Government (\$95 million), the State Government (\$74 million) and the City of Marion (\$5 million). The Project provides a significant opportunity for Council to enhance the public realm adjacent the station and improve links to the Marion Regional Centre and community connections.

Objectives for the contributing works and Smart Cities and Suburbs grant are:

- Seamless integration of public realm that provides enhanced connections to the Oaklands Station
- Smart precinct that incorporates real time data capture and information distribution; supporting economic development activities, public safety and community connections
- Dwyer Road Reserve community park and playground upgrade with integrated smart technology infrastructure
- A precinct approach to public art, place making and wayfinding to enhance the user experience

1. Funding Agreement

A funding agreement was endorsed by Council GC280818R05 resolving the following:

- Endorses Council's total contribution of up to \$5 million to the Oaklands Crossing Project as described within this report comprising of a contribution of \$1 million in 2018/19 and a further \$4 million over the years 2019/20 to 2021/22.
- Athorises the Chief Executive Officer to negotiate minor amendments to the Agreement where necessary to enable the progress of the Project.
- Authorises the Chief Executive Officer to enter into and sign the Agreement on behalf of Council.
- The \$1 million cash direct contribution is described in the agreement to be allocated to enable enhancement of the plaza spaces (at grade), streetscape landscape works and footpath connections within the project site.

Council's \$4 million of contributing works is described in the agreement as follows:

- 1. Project management, community consultation, design and construction of Council's Works;
- 2. Enhanced pedestrian and passenger access and amenity from the Minister's Works at Oaklands Railway Station to the adjacent residential and commercial precincts (as determined by Council in its absolute discretion):
- 3. Dwyer Road Reserve Reinstatement and upgrade works involving \$500,000 (exclusive of GST) which will be directed to the design, project management and capital works redevelopment of the Reserve post contractor demobolisation;
- 4. Modifications, maintenance and/or upgrade of Council roadways, infrastructure or land, adjacent to the Minister's Works that will support and enhance the Project (as determined by Council in its absolute discretion); and



5. Council's cost associated with interfacing with the Minister and the Alliance (project management and technical support).

2. Oaklands Smart Precinct

The Oaklands Smart Precinct proposal is focused on addressing known problems in the precinct and nearby areas, as well as using the opportunity to test and embed technology and data gathering devices (IoT) in key infrastructure elements of the precinct. As this is a pilot project, the sensor technology and data collection elements of the project enables Council to consider opportunities to scale and replicate to future precincts throughout the city. This provides a valuable opportunity for Council to understand how and why the community are using busy precincts and proactively monitor and deliver efficient and effective asset management and services.

Council was presented with a report GC260618 illustrating the following scope for the Oaklands Smart Precinct;

Oaklands Smart Precinct Defined Scope

- Connectivity south through to the Marion Cultural Centre, State Aquatic and Leisure Centre and Westfield Marion (Marion Regional Centre).
- Connectivity north through to train station plazas with facilities for bike storage, toilet and food truck/pop up shop spaces to local shops and the suburb of Warradale.

<u>Data Gathering</u> (Internet of Things)

- Pedestrian movements monitor usage, movement, dwelling times
- Smart Lighting enhanced asset management services (outages, dimming, operation, and maintenance), data collection capacity and management
- Wayfinding communicating locations, news and events in the area
- Smart Irrigation enabling efficient and effective irrigation of the reserve through real-time monitoring
- Parking technology solution communicate car park availability, time limits, and park type

Dwyer Road Reserve Smart Park

- Smart Plaza & Basketball area including USB plugs, charging station, solar panels, Wi-Fi
- Nature Play, Technology and Smart Play areas
- Smart BBQ & waste solutions
- CCTV covering reserve as a key destination and 'through' point from railway station.



3. Community Connection to Marion Regional Centre Concept Design

Refer to Attachment 3 for concept plans

Key Ideas

- Closure of Diagonal Way adjacent Dwyer Road Reserve (pedestrian/ cyclist link only)
- Develop a direct pedestrian and cyclist connection option from the train station to the Marion Cultural Centre, State Aquatic and Leisure Centre and further south to Westfield.
- Safer streets for pedestrian/ cyclist connections to Marion Regional Centre with less vehicle traffic volumes. (Pre-construction volumes Diagonal Way 1,655 average per day; Morphett Road 42,000 average per day).
- Creation of a larger community park incorporating a new playground and recreational facilities.
- Maintain vehicle access on Diagonal Way to resident properties and on street parking south of Dwyer Rd Reserve.
- Formalise car parking on Diagonal Way south of Dwyer Rd Reserve.
- Commuter car parking is reduced on Crozier Terrace and redistributed to Murray Terrace, Addison Avenue and Railway Terrace. This will likely reduce traffic volumes along Crew Street and Dwyer Rd at peak times.
- Proposed Pedestrian Actuated Crossing (PAC) on Diagonal Road adjacent Warracowie Way (subject to DPTI approval).
- Integration of smart precinct wayfinding and lighting technology.
- Enhanced amenity with street trees and shrub plantings
- Public art
- Future proofing for an autonomous vehicle to transit between the Regional Centre and Station along shared path.
- Maintain pedestrian paths on Morphett Road to Regional Centre as a secondary option.

Open Space

Dwyer Road Reserve to the south of the station is currently being occupied by the PTPA as a site compound. Upon completion of the works and demobilisation from site, the City of Marion will upgrade the reserve inclusive of play equipment, technology based infrastructure and improvement of amenities. The proposed concept is to maximise the open space and enhance safe pedestrian and cyclist linkages to the south east of Diagonal Road. The concept informs of the potential spatial arrangement of a smart plaza that will offer Wi-Fi, charging stations, seating and shelter; smart play incorporating new technology play equipment; smart running track that provides sensor technology for timing; community courts basketball and netball 3 on 3 in addition to the potential for a community garden and nature play. Detailed designs will be developed taking into consideration community feedback.

Traffic Management and Closure of Northern Section of Diagonal Way

Car parking to the Oaklands Station is redistributed across the corridor with the majority of parks being located on Murray Terrace (refer attachment 1- car parking configuration). Consequently, it is foreseeable that the volume of vehicle movements to the station through Crew Street, Dwyer Road and Diagonal Way will reduce.

Car park sensor wayfinding technology is proposed to create efficiencies within the precinct. Technology that informs of vacancy numbers and location will be explored and integrated.

Currently 37% of the population within 15 minutes' walk are located to the south east within Oaklands Park. This figure does not take into account visitation to the Regional Centre, which would elevate this figure considerably. Consequently, it is anticipated by improving walking and cycling infrastructure within this locality, more people will actively utilise public transport via walk and cycle transportation mode share.

A Pedestrian Actuated Crossing (PAC) is proposed on Diagonal Road within proximity to Trott Grove and Warracowie Way. This will provide direct access to the Marion Cultural Centre Plaza, SALC and further south to Westfield. The proposal will also provide a future connection to the 'Chrysler Trail' walking and cycling connection to the Tonsley Precinct.



The following table provides a summary of the advantages and disadvantages of the proposed Diagonal Way closure.

4. Partial Road Closure of Diagonal Way

To facilitate the development and expansion of Dwyer Road Reserve, it is proposed to close Diagonal Way, Oaklands Park, between the northern boundary of 10 Diagonal Way and the southern boundary of the intersection of Crozier Terrace and Dwyer Road.

A resolution of Council is required to commence the road closure process under the Roads (Opening & Closing) Act 1991, to close the road closure land as indicated on the attached plan (Attachment 8). The closed road will be merged with the land in Certificate of Title Volume 5854 Folio 339, for Dwyer Road Reserve.

The road closure land is currently under the control of the Commissioner of Highways under Section 26 of the Highways Act 1926 for Oaklands Crossing construction purposes. Section 26(8) of the Highways Act provides that any action taken by Council to exclude vehicles from a road under the Commissioner of Highway's care, control and management is of no effect unless approved by the Commissioner in writing.

The Commissioner of Highway's written approval will be sought by Administration.

Dwyer Road Reserve is classified as Community Land under the Local Government Act 1999 and is contained in Community Land Management Plan 9 – Principal Reserves.

Upon the closure of the portion of Diagonal Way, the road closure land will be classified as Community Land under the Local Government Act 1999 and will be included in Community Land Management Plan 9 – Principal Reserves.



5. Remaining Contributing Works

Verge treatments to local streets adjacent to the station have been investigated for improvements to pathways, street tree planting and amenity. Concepts for Railway Terrace, Addison Avenue, Murray Terrace and Crozier Terrace verge treatments will be developed in the scheduled business year as per proposed program of works. Consultation with Elected Members and community will be administered by staff as scheduled in Attachment 5.

CONCLUSION

The proposed program of works presented confirms Councils \$4 million contribution as per the funding agreement. The program integrates the Smart Cities and Suburbs grant which will enhance community and visitor experience within the precinct. Integrated technology will enable Council to test methods of service provision validated through data capture and analysis. As a pilot project, this will enable Council to consider applications for implementation to other precincts. The works program presents a practical scope of delivery, design budgets and time lines.

A concept plan illustrating a proposed pedestrian / cyclist connection to the regional centre and integrated community park has been developed. The concept creates an enhanced community park by closing the northern portion of Diagonal Way.

This report seeks Council endorsement for the proposed precinct works program and to consult with the community on the concept plans for the Dwyer Road Reserve and public realm associated to the proposed Diagonal Way road closure.

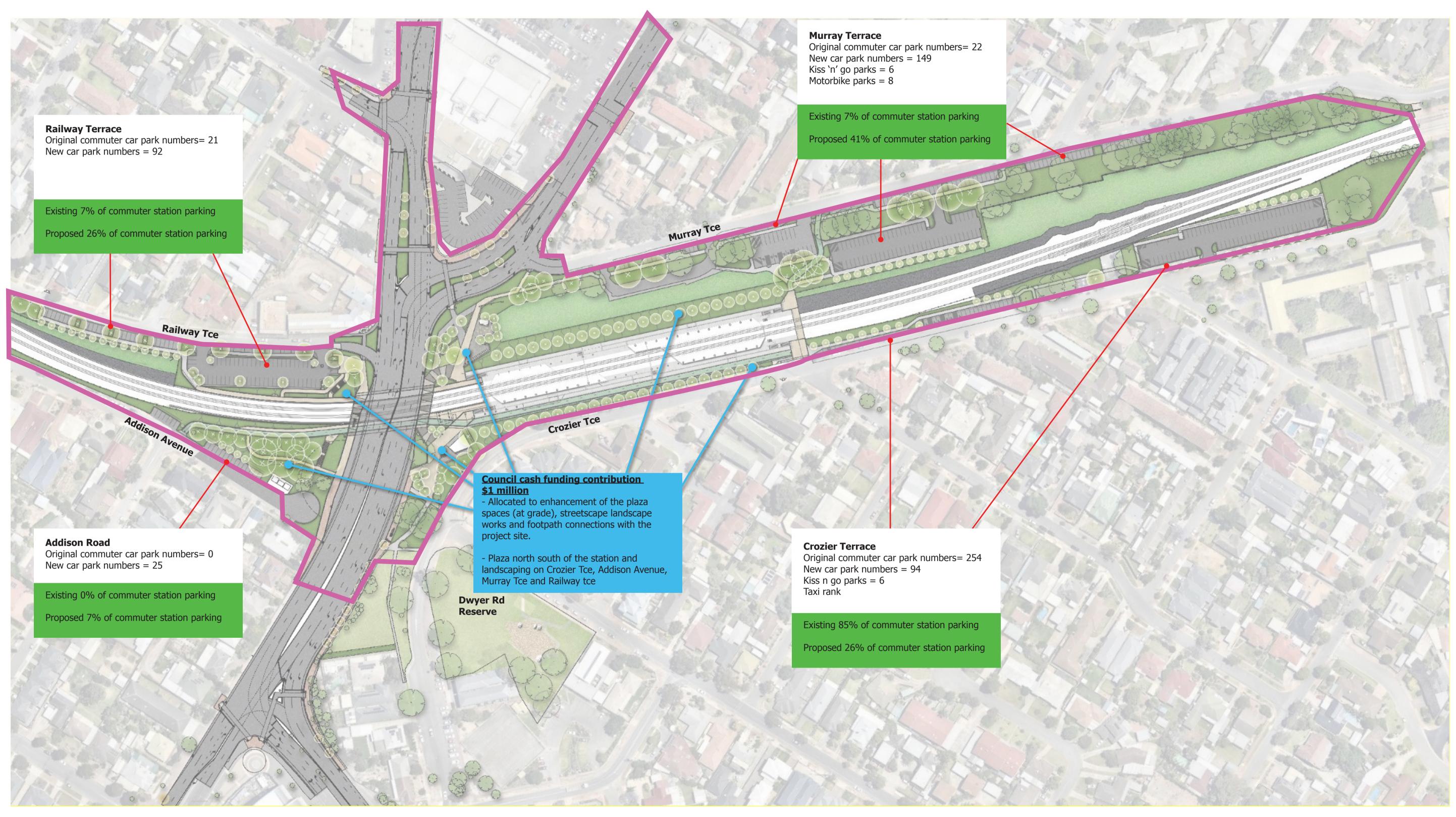

Attachment 3- Oaklands Works Program Concept Plans

Background

The Oaklands Crossing Grade Separation Project will improve safety for all road users and ease traffic congestion by lowering the roil line under the road and removing the level crossing. The project is being delivered by Public Transport Projects (PTP Alliance), including organisations McConnell Dowell, Mott MacDonald and ARUP, joining DPTI to deliver the project.

The proposed grade separated alignment is to be located to the south of the current train line to enable the operational service for the majority of the construction program, limiting impact on commuters.

City of Marion is a funding partner contributing \$5 million towards the delivery of the project. This funding comprises of;

- \$1million cash contribution 2018/19
- \$4million of future capital works budgets (2019-2022) utilising components of Footpath, Kerb and Water table, drainage, traffic and open space budgets.

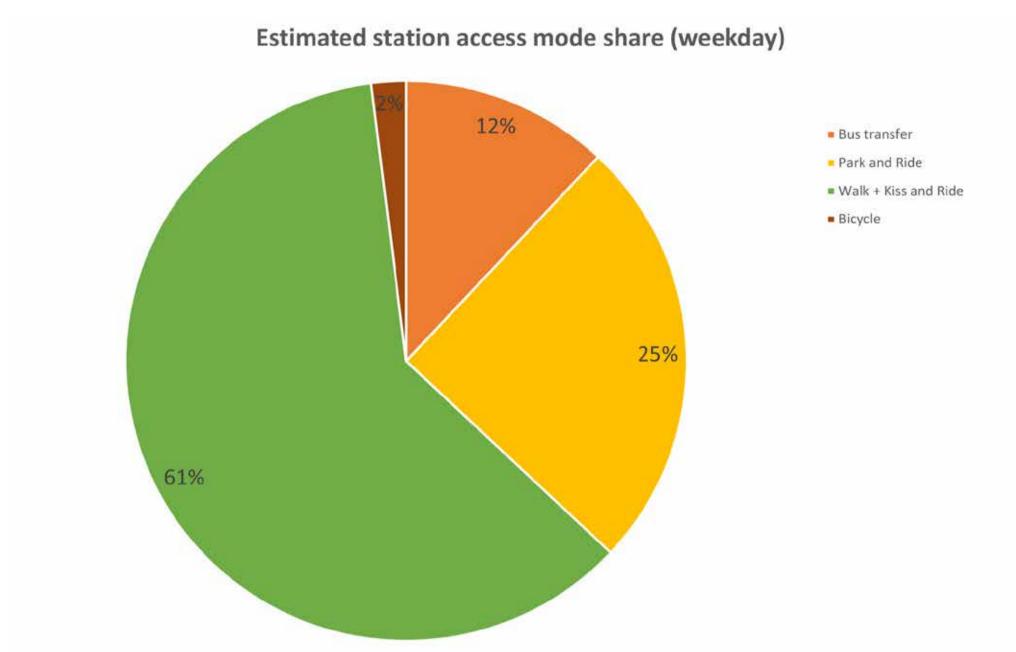

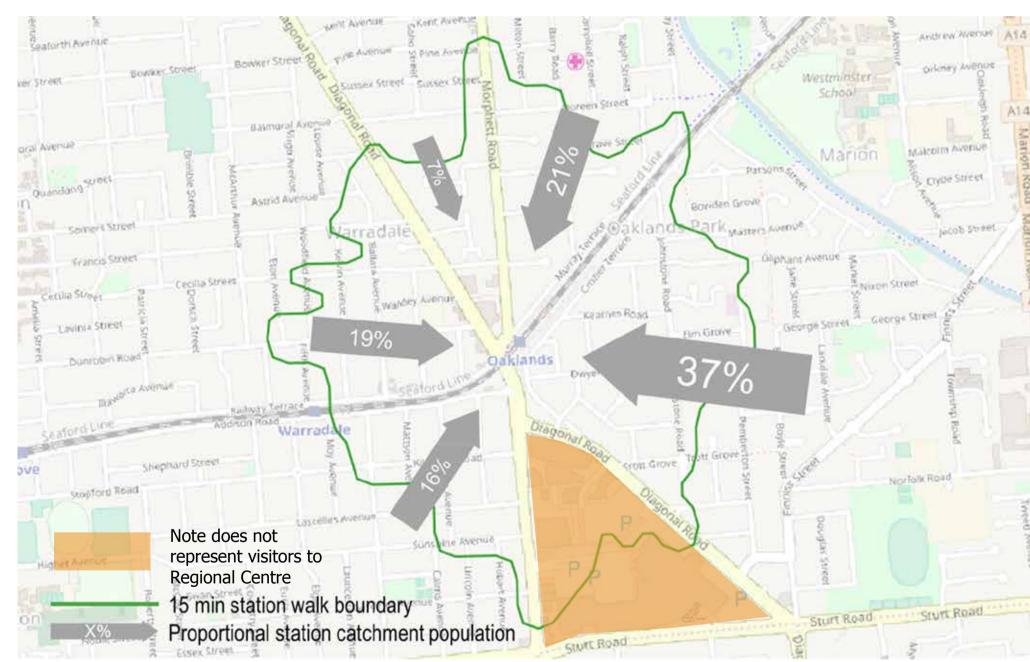

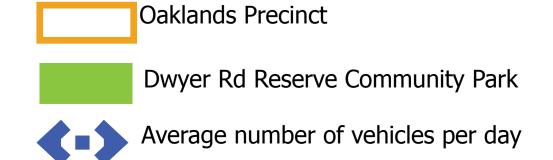

Directional split of population within 15 minute walk of Oaklands Station-PTPA Station Access Report (2018)



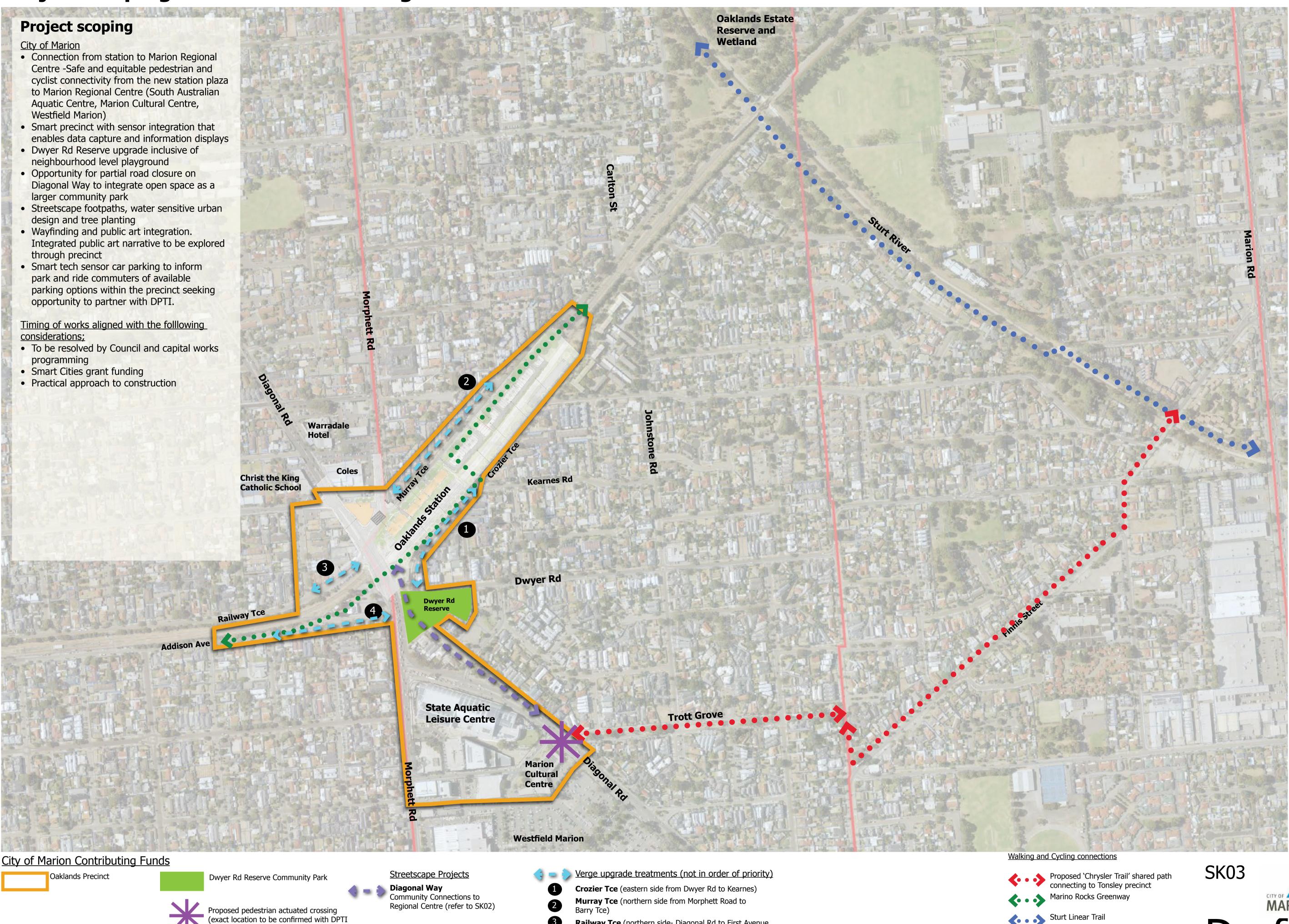

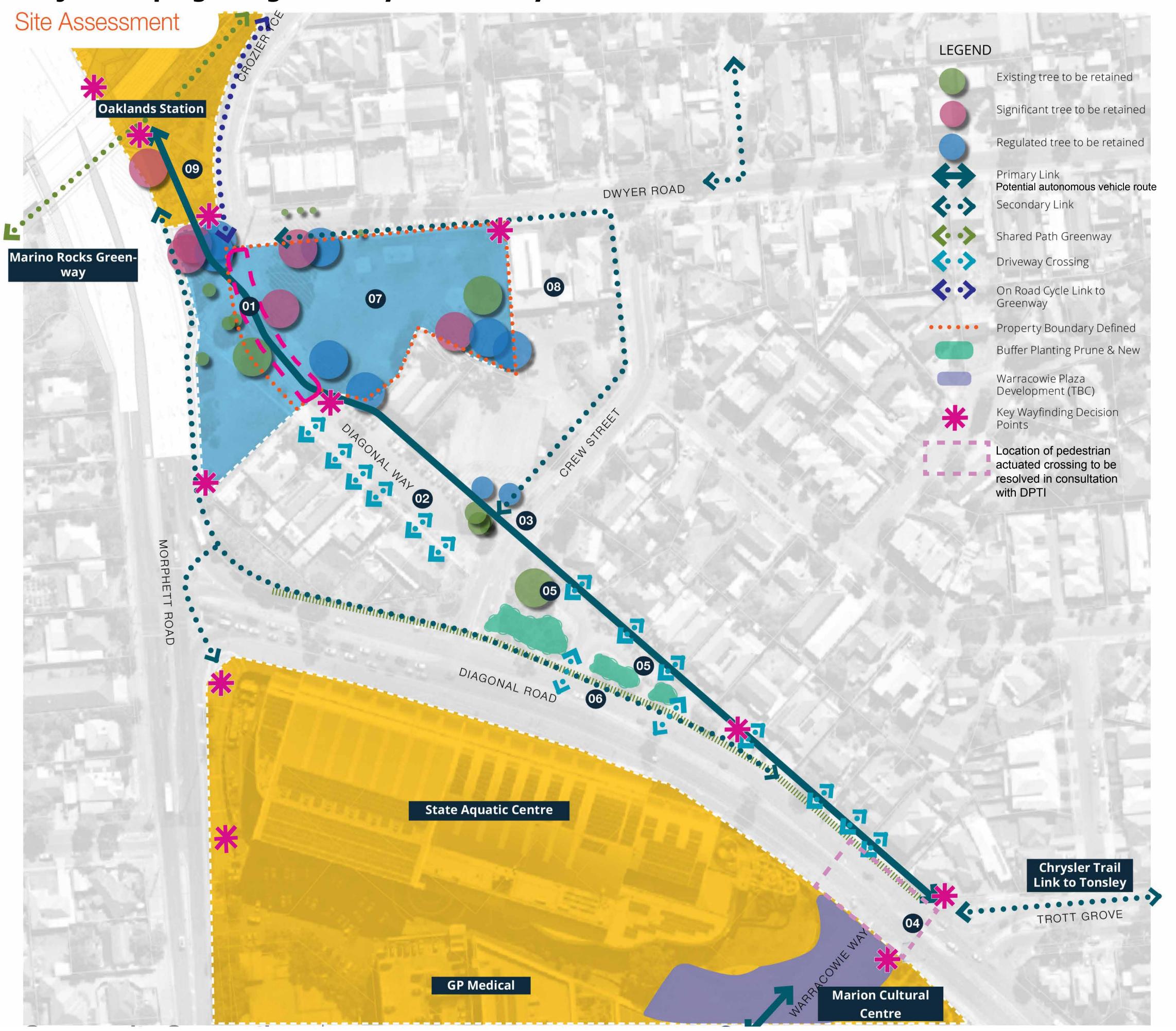

Analysis and Approach

ANALYSIS OF EXISTING CONDITIONS

The Oaklands Hub Connected Communities Report identifies the Oaklands Hub as the 'heart' to teh city of Marion. Central to this vision is the strategy to improve local connections, providing improved suburban connectivity and a higher level of amenity for pedestrians and cyclists. In that study, Diagonal Way and its extension to the north at Crozier Terrace provides a direct pedestrian and potential cycle link from the new grade separated Oaklands Station to Marion Regional Centre (Central Plaza) via a possible pedestrian activated crossing on Diagonal Road. It is also identified in the City of Marion's, Flinders Tonsley Precinct Integrated Transport & Parking Strategy as being a key shared-use connecting route to Tonsley (Chrysler Way).

Currently, the function of Diagonal Way is primarily to maximise parking & local vehicle access with narrow footpaths & limited bike facilities. It also provides access to Oaklands Station and the pre construction carpark on Crozier Terrace. However the car parking will be redistributed across the corridor onto Murray Tce (149), Railway Tce (92), Addison Road (25), and Crozier Tce (94). This will ultimately reduce to vehicle movements on Crozier and surrounding streets and there will be less supply of carparking. In addition, an inconsistency of street trees, amenity and buffer plantings significantly detract from the legibility and visibility of the connection to the Marion Regional Centre.

Dwyer Reserve currently functions as a local open space with basic amenities. The City's open space strategy and playground framework identifies Dwyer Reserve as a neighbourhood reserve incorporating a playspace. In the context of the Oaklands Crossing Grade Separation project, Dwyer reserve has the potential for increased activation, extending the public realm of the proposed Oaklands Station forecourt and providing a quality open space asset for the Marion community.

APPROACH

Diagonal Way has a unique opportunity to become more than a conduit for vehicles. By adopting the right approach and implementing considered design solutions, Diagonal Way can become a destination in its own right.

Opportunities exist to create a unique pedestrian friendly street experience that will moderate vehicle speeds and improve the function & legibility of pedestrian & cycle movements and amenity of Dwyer Reserve.

The following assessment of Diagonal Way highlights the functionality of the street's importance as both a Link and a Place.

STREET AS PLACE

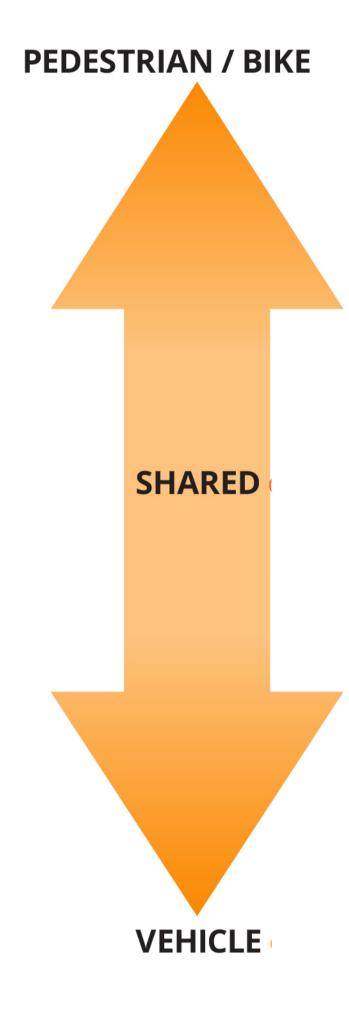
Vision: Street as a destination in its own right

Design objective: a place to spend time - a vital component of the public realm

As a Place, Diagonal Way and its surrounds can be a destination in its own right; a location where activities occur with an integrated connection to Dwyer Reserve and the Oaklands Station forecourt. Pedestrians and cyclists don't intend to just pass through the area many will be spending time in the area on a wide variety of activities (gathering, talking, waiting, resting).

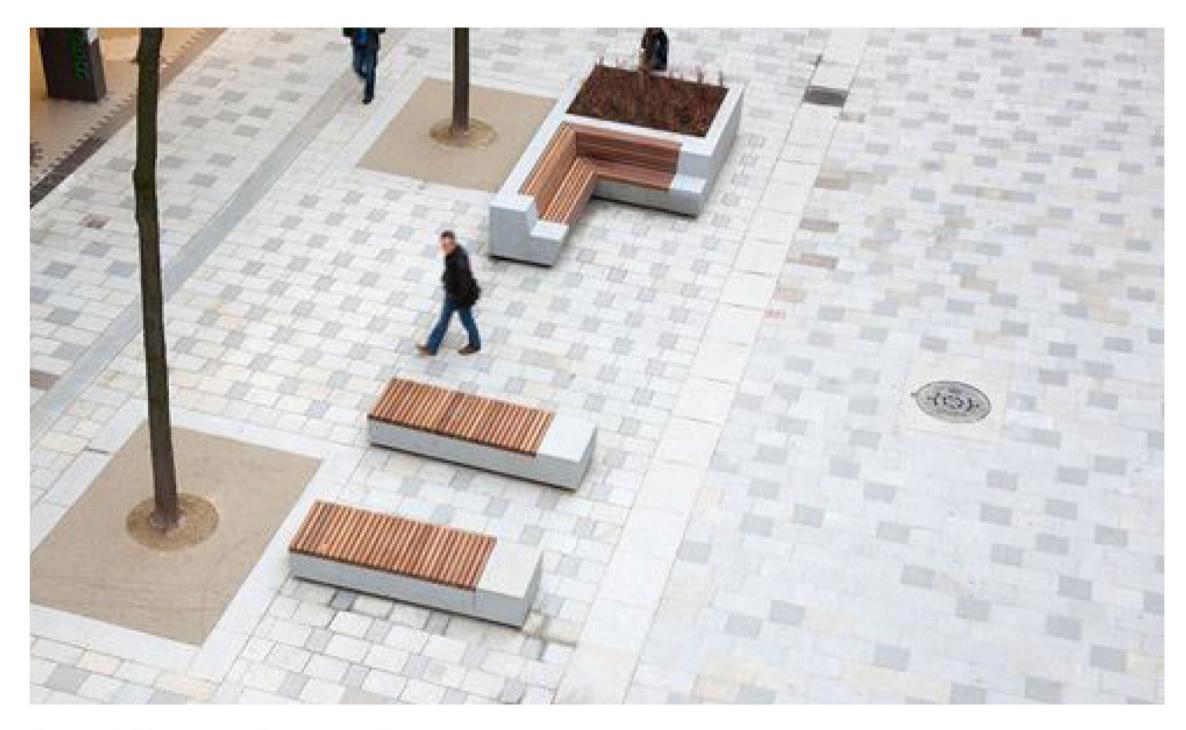
Studies have found that:

- the more shared the street, the more vehicular speed is reduced
- the more shared the street, the more pedestrians were observed within a notional carriageway space
- decrease in vehicles speeds results in significantly reduced fatalities from collisions; 48km/h (45% risk of fatality), 32km/h (5% risk of fatality)

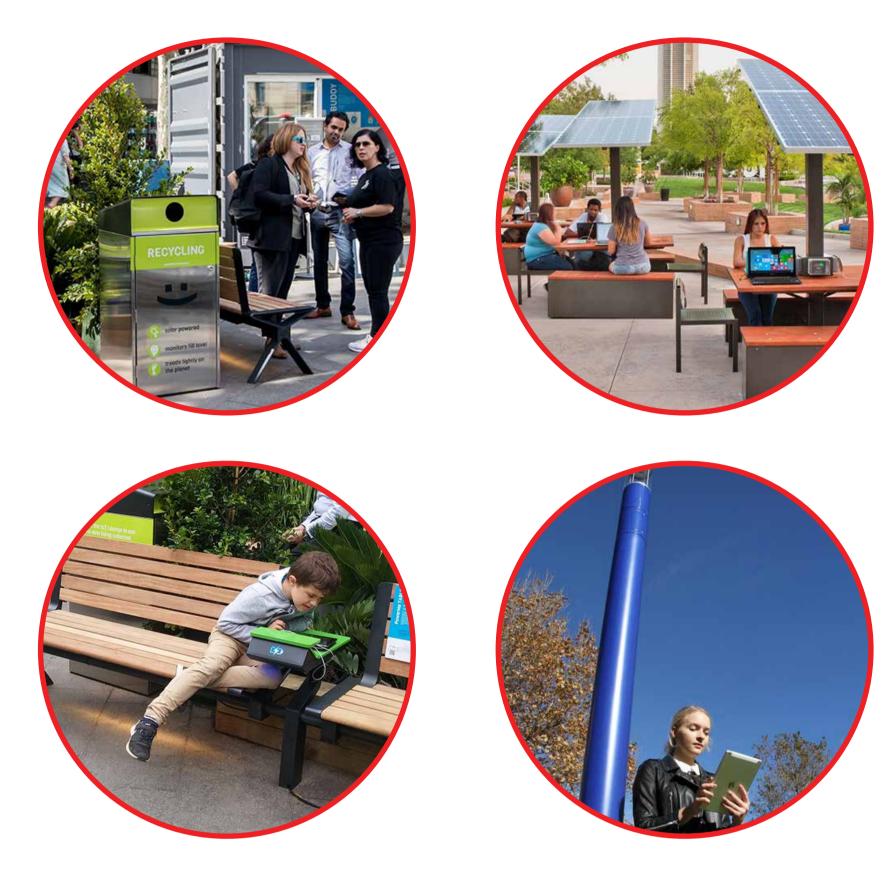

The purpose of this report is to provide council with the opportunity to respond to a request from the Australian Refugee Action Network to join with other local councils to advocate against the changes to the Status Resolution Support Services payment (RSS).

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Australian Refugee Action Network (ARAN) has written seeking support for a local government-led campaign to ensure that people living in our communities who are seeking asylum, or recognised as refugees, are not left without any income support (see Appendix 1).

The ARAN is inviting all local Councils to lend their support to the advocacy campaign launched by the City of Greater Dandenong recently, which is calling for the restoration of the Status Resolution Support Service (SRSS) payment.

RECOMMENDATION

That:

- 1. Council notes the receipt of the correspondence from the Australian Refugee Action Network.
- 2. Council advises how it wishes to respond to the request to support the campaign to advocate against the changes to the Status Resolution Support Services payment.
- 3. Administration advises the Australia Refugee Action Network of Council's decision.

DISCUSSION



In November 2018 the Australia Refugee Action Network (the ARAN) wrote to Council requesting support for a local government-led campaign to ensure that people living in our communities who are seeking asylum, or recognised as refugees are not left without any income support whatsoever. A copy of this letter is attached as Appendix 1.

The ARAN believe it is unreasonable to expect that local charities and local government will cover all living costs for those families and individuals who are unable to find work. They are inviting all local Councils to lend their support to the advocacy campaign launched by the City of Greater Dandenong recently, which is calling for the restoration of the Status Resolution Support Service (SRSS) payment, which is around \$35 a day (less than Newstart).

Campaign Councils

While the campaign was started by Victorian Councils it is now a nationwide campaign. The Local Government Mayoral Taskforce Supporting People Seeking Asylum was established in Victoria and is now inviting support from Council's nation wide. The purpose of the taskforce is to Coordinate joint state-wide advocacy by Councils and share resources and practical responses by communities to the issues caused by the SRSS cuts.

Following the request for support, additional information was sought and provided from the ARAN as follows:

Levels of Involvement

There are three levels of involvement -

1. Being an Executive Member means being part of a steering committee that meets monthly to drive



the campaign and being closely consulted on the strategy and operation of the campaign. It would be great to have a SA Council on board. While we have a growing NSW membership we haven't got any interstate Executive Members yet and an interstate perspective is important.

- 2. Being a **General Member** means being consulted on the high-level strategic direction of the taskforce and the campaign but not the rollout of the campaign like Executive members. It means making a commitment to promote the "Back Your Neighbour" campaign to your residents and ratepayers inc. to local media, answer requests for information about impacts and case studies of people/agencies affected (if relevant). Members are approached for funds on a purely optional basis you don't need to provide funds to be a member.
- 3. Being a **Supporter** means making a commitment to promote the "Back Your Neighbour" campaign to your residents and ratepayers inc. to local media, answer requests for information about impacts and case studies etc. but not being active in the taskforce i.e. you don't get a say in the campaign or work of the taskforce if you just become a supporter. Supporters would never even get requested for funding.

The level of Membership is not dependent on the financial contribution.

Financial Contribution

The funds collected are used by the campaign management consultancy for campaign management, campaign tool licensing, Facebook, advertising etc. The Taskforce Executive have engaged Social Change Projects who successfully ran the "Make Renting Fair" campaign that led to significant rental legislative reforms in Victoria. ARAN are currently asking for voluntary contributions of up to \$2,000 from Member Councils to continue to have Social Change on board but also to increase Facebook and other sorts of advertising of the campaign.

ARAN notes that becoming a member and needing to actually provide any money are not related. Council can be a member without contributing any funds.

City of Marion Impact

The main impact of cuts made to the SRSS is likely to be on the unofficial / unfunded services to new arrival communities who provide support via donations and volunteer hours. These services will continue to try to support people who don't have any means of government assistance, and will be even more greatly burdened by the removal of SRSS.

Mainstream emergency relief and financial counselling services (both Commonwealth and State funded services) are available to everyone including people currently linked to the SRSS program and these services may encounter a spike in demand as SRSS finishes up.

Council may not feel very much impact on the cut to SRSS except for responding to enquiries and making referrals to services that can still be of assistance. Where community / neighbourhood centres (such as Cooinda) have been delivering programs for this cohort they may notice an increased strain on individuals.

A refugee support agency has advised Council staff that they are already referring people on for settlement work if they are eligible for this service, addressing emergency relief and financial counselling cases as they arise, and can now refer directly to the Community Hubs program in northern Adelaide as this is open to all people irrespective of visa status. So far they have not noticed a big impact from SRSS changes to date. From their observations new arrivals mainly experience difficulties with bill shock (electricity mainly, school expenses such as laptops, uniforms, supplies etc. due to large families), white goods and furniture. There is great deal of pressure on charities around quarterly bill time. Affordable housing, if anything, is the biggest issue for new arrivals in Marion and surrounding areas.

Next Steps

Direction is now sought from Council as to how it wishes to respond to the request to support the campaign to advocate against the changes to the Status Resolution Support Services payment.



Administration will advise the ARAN of Council's resolution.

Dear Mayor and Councillors

Changes to the SRSS program are causing destitution in Australian communities - call for support

You may have heard that the Federal Government has recently withdrawn all income support for hundreds of people seeking asylum who are living in the community still waiting to have their claims for refugee status assessed – and the plan is to cut support for thousands more, including families.

The Status Resolution Support Service payment (SRSS) is less than \$35 a day (less than Newstart) and was designed to support people as they go through the prolonged process of seeking asylum. Most of that goes in rent so these changes will potentially leave those affected homeless. The total withdrawal of this minimal income support will leave people destitute, entirely reliant on charity to meeting housing costs and living expenses. It may also leave them without support services like trauma counselling.

Around 13,000 people living across Australia receive SRSS, including single people, the elderly, and families (including up to 4,000 children) enabling them to meet basic needs of food, rent and medical treatment.

Peak bodies, church and welfare organisations, together with grassroots advocacy groups have been actively lobbying to have these cuts reversed. Thanks to coordinated lobbying, plans to cut this support for families have been delayed, though only until early next year. Individuals on the other hand have already been having their benefits cut so the situation is desperate and urgent. For further details about the cuts see the Refugee Council of Australia Factsheet and Australian Churches Refugee Taskforce background on SRSS cuts referenced below.

What you can do - join other LGAs who support the restoration of SRSS

We are writing to ask you to join with other local Councils to advocate for the reversal of these harsh cuts, and the reinstatement of this income support. It is a local issue affecting the welfare of people in local communities so it is vital that local Councils raise their voice.

A growing number of Councils led by the City of Greater Dandenong have formed a taskforce against the cuts. See below a list of Councils already supporting this initiative.

The Local Government Mayoral Taskforce Supporting People Seeking Asylum has been established in Victoria and is inviting support from councils nationwide. They are working with peak bodies like the Refugee Council of Australia, Asylum Seeker Refugee Centre, Australian Refugee Action Network and Rural Australians for Refugees to maintain advocacy on this issue.

REPORT OBJECTIVE

This report outlines a plan to stage a community picnic in Marion as an act of solidarity with Muslim and non-Muslim Australians following the tragic events in Christchurch.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

- 1. Writes to the Mayor of Christchurch to express our condolences over the terrorist attack, which killed or injured more than 100 people.
- 2. Stages a Marion Community Picnic as an act of solidarity with Muslim and non-Muslim Australians
- 3. Approve up to \$11,000 for the Marion Community Picnic, with the money to be identified through savings in the 2018/19 third budget review process.

DISCUSSION

Marion Council has an estimated 2000 members of the Muslim community, many of whom are shaken by the events in New Zealand.

A Marion Community Picnic – open to everyone in our community – would be held in an atmosphere of goodwill. The aim would be to demonstrate compassion and the need to respect and include all Australians in our community.

A service on 17 March at the Marion mosque attracted more than 1000 people of all faiths to honour the 100 people killed and injured. One member of the Marion community has lost three relatives in the Christchurch attack.

In addition to a picnic, the Mayor may also wish to write to the Mayor of Christchurch Lianne Dalziel to express Council's sympathy over the events.

Format

The format of the Marion Community Picnic would be:

Date: Either Sunday 31 March or Sunday 7 April

Time: 6pm-7.30pm (March 31) or 5pm-6.30pm (7 April as daylight savings has ended unless lighting is used)

Location: Hendrie Street Reserve, Park Holme



Attendances: Forecast at between 500 to 1500 people

Food: Council would provide Halal meat and vegetarian patties at no cost. Families would be encouraged to BYO salads. Water and a coffee van would be provided.

Speakers: Mayor Hanna and a representative from the mosque to deliver a prayer.

Other: People will be encouraged to leave flowers or write messages in a condolence book. The event will be promoted via social media, an advert in the Messenger and through direct invitation, depending on the date selected.

Budget

The cost of the Marion Community Picnic is estimated at up to \$11,000, depending upon attendances and the date selected. A breakdown of the estimated costs is:

Marquee \$900

Promotion \$1,200 (only if staged on 7 April)

Lighting \$1,300 (only if staged in the evening on 7 April)

PA system \$1,000 Security x4 \$2,400

Catering

500 people \$1,400 500-1000 people \$2,800 1000-1500 people \$4,200

Risk

Council will activate its routine risk management procedures for staging a community event and has notified SAPOL.

REPORT OBJECTIVE

The objective of this monthly report is to provide Council with assurance that the City of Marion has effective strategies in place to meet its legal obligations as outlined in the Work Health and Safety Act (SA) 2012 and to monitor Council's core target of a 10% reduction of the Lost Time Injury Frequency Rate (LTIFR) from the previous year.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

1. Notes the report and statistical data contained therein.

DISCUSSION

Targets and performance indicators have been established in order to measure the continual improvement of the program. Performance against these targets are measured in two ways:

- positive performance indicators (PPI's); and
- lag performance indicators (LPI's) both of which are outlined in **Appendix 1.**

The current LTIFR is 4.7 with two lost time injuries being recorded this financial year (as outlined in the attachment, it should be noted that one of these is yet to be determined). The LTIFR has reduced by 32% when compared to last years result of 6.9 at the same time and is currently 34% below the industry comparison LTIFR rate of 7.1.

Key initiatives implemented which have contributed to the reduction in LTIFR include:

- The ongoing implementation of SkyTrust WHS Management System.
- Safety Observation program where front-line staff are visited and observed by people leaders.
- Regular monitoring of the close-out of Corrective and Preventative Actions.
- Ongoing review of SWMS, SWPs and SOPs.
- Piloting of an internal WHS Audit and Contractor Surveillance program.
- Positive fit-for-work and well-being programs

CONCLUSION

The ongoing significant reduction in Lost Time Injuries being 78% over the 2016/17 and 2017-18 reporting periods has been a commendable achievement for the City of Marion as it continues in its commitment to place the community and safety at the forefront of everything we do in line with our corporate values. In the 2018-19 reporting period, we will consolidate and further build on the good work that has been implemented and aim to achieve Council's KPI of 10% or greater reduction in LTIFR compared to the end of 2017-18 reporting period.

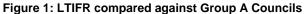

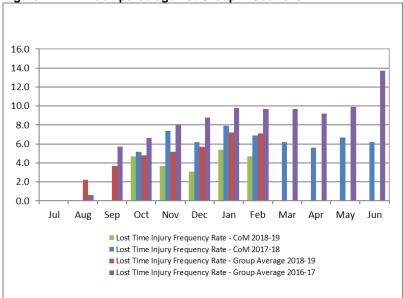

Lost Time Injury Frequency Rate (LTIFR), is an industry standard tool for measuring LTI's within a given reporting period which enables comparison to other organisations. Council's LTIFR is outlined in Figure 1, from the LGA's Member Portal data once claims have been determined and can be measured and monitored against our industry counterparts being the Group A Councils (¹GaC).



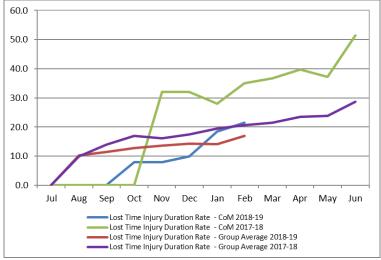


The current LTIFR for the City of Marion (represented in green) is **4.7** with two lost time injuries being claimed. It should be noted that although two workplace injuries have been 'reported' there is another LTI which has been 'claimed'. The claim is yet to be determined/accepted and wasn't reported as a specific incident didn't occur in the workplace however it is for a degenerative condition associated with duties undertaken over a sustained period of time. The LTIFR has reduced by **32**% when compared to last years result of **6.9** at the same time and is **34**% below the industry comparison LTIFR rate of **7.1**.

Lost Time Injury Duration Rate

The Lost Time Injury Duration Rate (LTIDR), is an industry standard tool for measuring the average days lost from LTI's within a reporting period to enable comparison to other organisations. Council's LTIDR is outlined in Figure 2, data is sourced from the LGA's Member Portal once claims have been determined and can be measured and monitored against our industry counterparts being the GaC.

Figure 2: LTIDR compared against Group A Councils

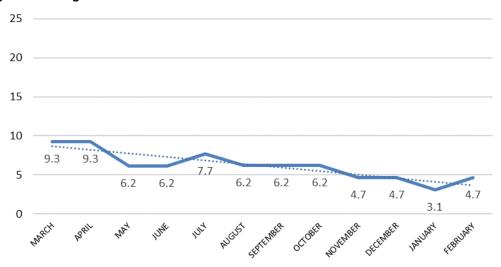


The current LTIDR for the City of Marion (represented in blue) is **21.5** which is **39%** less than the **35.0** recorded at the same time last year however it is **26%** above the industry comparison LTIDR rate of **17.0**.

Rolling Lost Time Injury Frequency Rate

Rolling LTIFR, outlined with a solid blue line in Figure 3 from internal incident report data, provides analysis of the average LTIFR over the last 12 months. The dotted blue 'median' line tracks the downward trend.

Figure 3: Rolling LTIFR

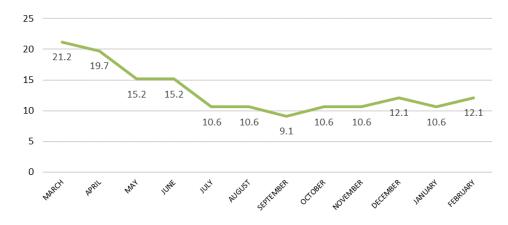


The current rolling LTIFR for the City of Marion is **4.7**, which represents a **49%** reduction over the previous 12 months.

Rolling Total Recordable Incident Frequency Rate

REPORT OBJECTIVE

To provide Council with an update on the progress of the proposed Coastal Walkway from Heron Way Reserve to south of the Field River at Hallett Cove.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

At the 29 January 2019 General Council meeting, a progress report was presented to Council regarding a proposed walkway from Heron Way Reserve to south of the Field River at Hallett Cove (GC190129R11), Council endorsed:

That Council:

1. Notes the progress report and that a further report summarising specialists (Environmental and Cultural Heritage) assessment and the outcomes of community consultation will be presented to Council 26 March 2019.

This report provides an update on Council's previously endorsed resolutions and project objectives that have been achieved so far, which include:

- Community consultation completed
- The draft Flora and Fauna Study has been received and is currently being reviewed by Administration
- Cultural Heritage specialists to be engaged
- Community Land Management Plan (CLMP) brief has been developed for the purpose of engaging an external consultant

RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

1. Notes the progress report and that a further report will be brought to Council as soon as Administration have the required specialist information to present Council with all the information they need to make an informed decision.

Liveable: Enhancement of community living, assists in creating vibrant community

facilities and open spaces.

Valuing Nature: Promotes biodiversity (plants and animals on public or private land,

coastal area and marine development), and improves opportunities for

people to play in open spaces and interact with nature.

Engaged: Encourages the community to be engaged and empowered to influence



the improvement of their own neighbourhood.

Connected: Enhanced ability for social interaction, improves movement across the city,

enhances walking path connections across the city.

Legal / Legislative / Policy: Identification of relevant legislation has been provided in Appendix 1

Other Funding Sources: Grant funding opportunities may exist through the Open Space Grant

Funding program which supports strategic Coast Park initiatives or

through Federal Government funding.

DISCUSSION

The City of Marion Coastal Walkway is a highly valued and well used community asset which attracts visitors into the region and contributes to the liveability of the City.

At the General Council meeting held on 11 September 2018, Council considered the strategic alignment of its coastal assets and endorsed the development of a Coast Park Plan encompassing the entire City of Marion coast line with priority given to the section of coast between Heron Way Reserve to south of the Field River.

Community Consultation

Consultation for the proposed coastal walkway section of coast between Heron Way Reserve to south of the Field River was undertaken from 14 November to 12 December 2018.

Submissions received from agencies, interest groups and community members were very detailed, incorporating historical and current information for Council to consider. This feedback has been reviewed with key themes identified for Council's consideration. The following themes have been mentioned across the feedback provided:

- Vegetation
- Fencina
- Hooded Plovers
- Signage
- Dogs
- · Shoreline accessibility
- Dunes
- Bridge connection
- Proposed locations / preferred alignments
- · Storm events, high tides
- Native flora and fauna
- Risk and injury
- Tourism
- · Recreation, health benefits
- Cultural significances

To ensure Council exercises due diligence a considered response to the above themes will be addressed in the future Council Report.

Prior to progressing draft concept designs for a potential path, consideration should be given to consulting with the community and agency stakeholders on potential alternative (if more than one options is available) path alignments.

Flora and Fauna Study

A draft specialist report for the flora and fauna has been received and provides recommendations regarding flora and fauna within the project area and for the EBPC referral process. Administration are currently in the



process of analysing this report. The findings of this report will be presented to Council for consideration in conjunction with the analysis of the community consultation results and cultural heritage assessment.

Cultural Heritage specialists

Attempts to engage Cultural Heritage specialists were made with neither submitting tenders, hence there has been a delay in the receipt of the cultural heritage advice. Administration has since identified other potential consultants who may be able to provide this.

All Aboriginal sites and objects are protected under the Aboriginal Heritage Act 1988 (the Act), whether they are listed in the Register or not. Council should further consider the legal advice (refer confidential Appendix 1) and a map and advice from Cabinet pertaining to Aboriginal heritage sites (refer confidential Appendices 2 and 3).

Community Land Management Plan (CLMP)

A brief has been developed for the purpose of engaging an external consultant to prepare the CLMP for the entire length of the City of Marion coastline for the Coast Park Plan.

This independent process will take some months to be completed and will require community consultation and endorsement by Council.

Risk Management and Legal Considerations

In September 2017, the Supreme Court of South Australia delivered judgement of a judicial review action lead by the Coastal Ecology Protection Group, challenging the City of Charles Sturt's path decisions to construct a shared use path along a section of the coast (including a boardwalk through the coastal sand dunes).

This decision needs to be considered by the Local Government sector in relation to coastal walkways and infrastructure, community consultation policies and community land management plans.

The development of the Coastal Walkway requires consideration of the relevant legislation (refer Appendix 1).

Legal advice has been sought and provided on the best approach associated with constructing assets within the coastal area to ensure all relevant factors are considered (refer confidential Appendix 1 GC190326F01).

Conclusion

Staff require additional time to receive cultural heritage advice and to incorporate feedback into the final report.

For Council to make an informed decision regarding the next stage of this project, it is essential that Council consider all feedback and specialist advice simultaneously.

REPORT OBJECTIVE

To receive and note the information contained within the *Questions Taken on Notice Register* provided in Appendix 1.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The 'Code of Practice – Procedures At Council Meetings 2017/18' states that:

REPORT OBJECTIVE

This report provides Council with information relating to the management of financial resources under its control as at February 2019. This report is one of a series of reports designed to assist Council in achieving and maintaining a financially sustainable position. Other reports assisting in this process include the Quarterly Budget Reviews and the LongTerm Financial Plan.

It is considered appropriate that financial information regarding Major Projects be presented on a monthly basis in this report. The principles used for assessment of reportable projects are according to the following criteria:

- Council has agreed to proceed with the project and approved a Section 48 Prudential Report.
- The Whole-of-LifeCost is greater than \$4 million dollars (including grant assisted projects).
- Has a project life of more than 12 months.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

GENERAL ANALYSIS

BACKGROUND

This report is presented on a monthly basis to provide Elected Members with key financial information to assist in monitoring Council's financial performance against budget.

DISCUSSION:

Appendix 1 contains a financial report to identify Council's performance against budget utilising a "Funding Statement". It provides a review against all of the elements contained within the Statement of Comprehensive Income and Statement of Financial Position that are adopted as part of the Annual Budgeting process. The detailed Capital Works graphs provide a weighting of the projects against budget. As an example, a graph with a total budget of \$100k spread over two projects, where Project A has a budget of \$90k it now accounts for 90% of the works when complete and project B with its budget of \$10k now accounts for 10% of the works when complete.

Funding Statement - Actual versus Budget

The Funding Statement provides a view of Council's financial performance against the approved budget and is consistent with the information provided at budget reviews. It provides a review against all of the elements contained within the Statement of Comprehensive Income and the Statement of Financial Position that are adopted as part of the Annual Budget Report. It details Council's:

Statement of Comprehensive Income -

The operating result is recognised as one of Council's key financial indicators. The budget framework includes a commitment to its ongoing Financial Sustainability maintaining an Operating Surplus Ratio of between 0% and 5%, on average over each five-year period, which for 2018/19 means a targeted operating surplus of between \$0 and \$4.625m.

Comment: Council currently has a net operating surplus result of \$9.930m before capital revenues, against a year to date forecast budget of \$6.542m surplus. This position is detailed in the attached Funding Statement and variation notes.

Capital Budget -

The Capital Budget is linked to Council's key financial indicator – "Asset Sustainability Ratio" and an actual to budget comparison reflects Council's progress in achieving its Capital program.

Comment: The actual to budget position reveals that 76.85% of the year to date Capital Renewal Budget has been spent.

The actual progress to date of Council's full Capital New and Renewal Expenditure program is detailed by asset class in the attached graphs (appendix 2).

Loans -

The loans component of the Funding Statement identifies any new proposed loan receipts or principal payments. Council's borrowings are included in Council's key financial indicator – "Net Financial Liabilities" which reflects Council's total indebtedness.

Comment: No new borrowings are included in the 2018/19 budget and principal repayments of \$1.100m mean that the overall loan liability balance is forecast to decrease by \$1.100m to \$6.805m at 30 June 2019.

Reserves & Cash -

Various fund movements such as surplus budget review results, unspent grants and carryover projects at year end are reflected as transfers to reserves, whilst utilisation of reserve funds are recognised as transfers from reserves.

Cash may be utilised to fund expenditure within the context of Treasury Management to ensure loans are not drawn down where temporary cash holdings are available.

Comment: Councils Reserves are detailed in the below table. Transfer to Reserves of \$0.948m and Transfers from Reserves of \$24.141m are forecast to occur in 2018/19, and after accounting for amounts quarantined for specific projects or works, there is \$6.297m available.

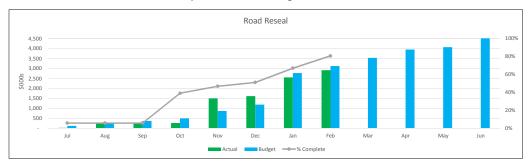
Funding Statement Cumulative Position - 2018/19



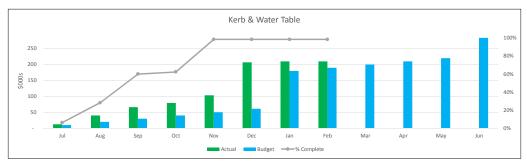




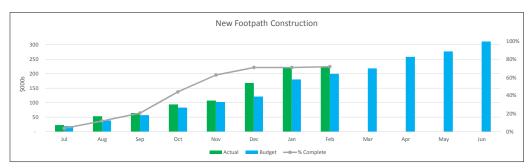
Capital Construction Progress - 2018/19



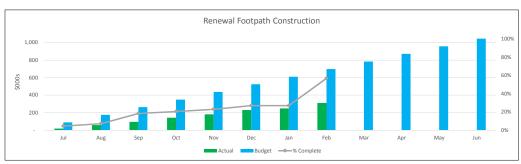

Current rates represent the total amount of rates levied in the current financial year that are not yet due for payment. For example at 1st January this represents Quarter 3 & Quarter 4 rates unpaid.

Note 2: Overdue

Overdue rates represent rates levied in the current financial year that remain unpaid past their due payment date. For example on 1st January, this represents rates from Quarter 1 and Quarter 2 that remain unpaid.

Note 3: Arrears

Rates in arrears represent rates and charges levied in previous financial years that remain unpaid .

Note 4: Interest

Interest represent the fines and interest applied to overdue rates and rates in arrears.

Note 5: Postponed

Postponed rates represent any rates amount due by seniors that have been granted a deferral, until the eventual sale of their property, as allowable under the Local Government Act. Interest is charged on these deferred rates and is recoverable when the property is sold.

Staff Comments:

The City of Marion has made significant progress over the past 5 years in addressing climate change, across many areas of council business. A summary of the City of Marion's current climate change responses is provided in Attachment 1.

A discussion at the 18 June 2019 Elected Member's Forum is scheduled to update on achievements to date from Council's Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy Plan and identify forward priorities that include reducing carbon emissions from Council's operations and activities.

Council Action in the Climate Emergency (CACE) is a grassroots campaign established in Victoria to encourage and support Australian councils adopting a climate emergency response. Currently, 12 Councils across Australia have recognised or declared a climate emergency including the Town of Gawler in South Australia. The City of Adelaide will consider this matter at it's meeting on Tuesday 26 March 2019 in response to a petition calling on the Lord Mayor and Councillors of the City of Adelaide to declare a climate emergency that currently has 518 signatures.

The District Council of Mt Barker has proposed the following motion for the LGA General Meeting on 12 April 2019: "That the Ordinary General meeting requests Councils and the LGA accord the climate emergency high priority, seek to endorse policies and actions which support mitigation as well as adaptation to climate change and actively lobby state and federal governments to move rapidly to adopt and fund a climate emergency response."

CACE partners with the international Climate Emergency Declaration campaign. 407 Councils across Australia, USA, Canada, UK and Switzerland have made climate emergency declarations to date.

Should this motion be supported, the discussion on the Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy Plan in June will provide an opportunity to consider actions to immediately reduce carbon emission as quickly as possible.

City of Marion Climate Change Policy – endorsed by Council in Sept 2016 (https://cdn.marion.sa.gov.au/sp/Documents-Policies/Climate-Change-Policy.pdf)

Resilient South (https://www.resilientsouth.com/)

- Partnership between the City of Marion and Cities of Holdfast Bay, Mitcham Onkaparinga and the South Australian Government aimed at strengthening southern Adelaide so that our businesses, communities and environments can respond to the challenges of climate change.
- Resilient South Regional Climate Change Adaptation Plan endorsed by all 4 partner Councils in 2014; recommends 57 preferred adaptation actions relating to 10 key decision areas (described as pathways). The economic, environmental and social domains across the southern region can use these pathways to guide their own adaptation action.
- Resilient South Southern Region Local Government Implementation Plan 2015 2019 –
 endorsed by all 4 partner Councils in 2015; identifies priority focus areas for the four partner
 Councils; currently being reviewed and updated.
- Climate Change Sector Agreement In February 2018, the Cities of Mitcham, Onkaparinga, Marion
 and Holdfast Bay and the Government of South Australia signed a new Resilient South Sector
 Agreement for Climate Change Adaptation for the Southern Adelaide Region (2018-2020). The
 Sector Agreement acknowledges the importance of taking a leadership role in climate change and
 sustainability and commits to take a collaborative approach to tackle climate change impacts and
 work towards reducing greenhouse gas emissions.
- Urban Thermal Mapping –On 22 February 2016 we captured high resolution thermal infrared
 imagery to analysis land surface temperature across the region. The purpose of this is to identify and
 prioritise open space and public areas most vulnerable to urban heat to prioritise urban cooling
 initiatives across the region such as tree planting, revegetation, water sensitive urban design, etc.
 (will be publicly available online soon)
- Climate Ready Communities a partnership with the Australian Red Cross to help communities
 prepare for intensified extreme events under climate change. Climate Ready Champions training is
 empowering people to understand the risks they currently face, the way these are changing, and
 what they can do to build their resilience. (https://www.redcross.org.au/saclimateready)

Energy Efficiency and Renewables

- Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy Plan endorsed by Council in July 2018
- 410kW solar installed across 10 Council operated sites
- 94kW solar installed on 4 sporting clubs and facilities
- 70kW (approx.) installed on 5 community use buildings
- Energy efficiency upgrades to lighting, etc. completed at 10 high energy using operated sites and a number of leased buildings
- 5 hybrid Toyota Corolla passenger vehicles included in Council vehicle fleet further alternative fuelled vehicles to be considered at fleet renewal

Coastal Climate Change Management

- A study to identify site and asset specific vulnerabilities in its coastal zone, and to develop a more
 detailed understanding of localised risk and actions needed to support effective coastal
 management.
- Provides a baseline for future analysis of cliff stability and potential stormwater erosion or seawater inundation issues. Will also help us analyse our future risks to sea level rise.

Water Management

- Oaklands Wetland capture, clean and store up to 400 million litres of stormwater each year, when fully operational. Water used to irrigate public open spaces and reserves in Council's northern and central regions.
- Landscape Irrigation Management Plan developed to guide what we irrigate, when we irrigate and how much water we use.

Greening

- Remnant Native Vegetation Plan 2018 2023 (endorsed by Council in 2018) outlines the
 principles that will underpin the management of remnant native vegetation and the strategies that
 will be implemented to protect and manage remnant vegetation.
- Tree Management Policy and Tree Management Framework (endorsed by Council in 2018) guides the provision and management of trees on Council land including streets, parks and reserves that will 'green' the city to enhance biodiversity and habitat value over time.
- Natural Landscapes Design and Maintenance Guidelines (endorsed by Council in July 2017) –
 provides guidance on establishment and management of typology types to be applied within natural
 landscaping areas forming Council parks and reserves. The natural landscaping typologies are
 designed to reduce maintenance costs in comparison with pre-existing site management
 approaches. As a rule, no typologies will be established or maintained using irrigation with potable
 water.
- Annual tree planting program: Street-scaping: 50 mature trees in 2-3 streets; Tree-scaping: 400 mature trees; Street tree planting: currently 1,400 increasing to 3,000 (~750 p/a removed); Reserve planting: 200 trees plus 30,000 tubestock (shrubs, grasses, etc.); additional amenity planting as required.

Community Education and Engagement

- SAEDB Energy Project improving the energy performances of businesses in southern Adelaide.
- Common Thread a monthly, sustainability program at Cooinda Neighbourhood Centre on the first Monday evening of the month from March to November.
- Valuing Marion's Nature project A range of events and activities to connect community members with nature and help them learn about natural environments in our city.
- Waste and Recycling Education free presentations and workshops on recycling and waste management to residents, community groups, schools and businesses.
- Natural Resources Management Education a school and preschool sustainability program to
 help plan and manage environmentally friendly initiatives, delivered in partnership with Natural
 Resources Adelaide and Mt Lofty Ranges. Program includes development of a Climate Ready
 Schools initiative that has initially been piloted with a number of schools in the City of Onkaparinga
 (https://www.naturalresources.sa.gov.au/adelaidemtloftyranges/education)
- Ask Me I'm Green regular Environmental Engagement Officer visits to neighbourhood and community centres to provide a drop-in service for residents to find out about sustainable living, etc. commenced at Glandore Community Centre in Feb 2019.



Footpaths

Question:

Question:

- 1. How many roads are still without a footpath.
- 2. When will all roads have at least one footpath.
- 3. What is the estimated timeline and cost to complete these works

Supporting Information:

In April 2016 the City of Marion had 54 roads that did not have a footpath. Council subsequently ensured that there was ongoing funding to ensure that we would provide at least one footpath in every road.

Response Received From:

Staff Comments:

1. How many roads are still without a footpath.

There are currently 48 roads that do not have a footpath on at least one side of the street within the City of Marion.

It should be noted that:

- 46 of these remaining roads are cul-de-sacs.
- In many instances residents within these cul-de-sacs have requested that Council do not install a
 footpath, stating there is little to no pedestrian demand and/or they do not want their landscaping
 removed or destroyed.

The priority for providing footpaths has been based on:

- The generation of pedestrians, for example access to schools and public transport.
- Ensuring continuity and safety in the network .

Within next year's footpath program (2019/20), 9 of the 11 projects are delivering the above-mentioned renewal / upgrade components.

2. When will all roads have at least one footpath.

Due to residents' concerns (as depicted above) this is difficult to estimate. The present rate is 2 per year.

3. What is the estimated timeline and cost to complete these works.

Of the 48 roads, two are listed within the 2019/20 Capital Works Budget. However, if the provision of these footpaths is seen as a priority the estimated time frame could be reduced, as depicted below.

Number of Years



4 footpaths per year	12
5 per year	10
6 per year	8
7 per year	7

Based on an average length of these cul-de-sacs the total estimated cost is \$600,000.
