National NAIDOC Week is held in the first week of July every year and celebrates and recognises the history culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

## Nunga Screen 2023, Tuesday, 4 July, 7 – 9 pm, Marion Cultural Centre

Nunga Screen shares and celebrates First Nations culture, stories and language through film, showcasing the work of First Nations filmmakers.

This free annual event spans National Reconciliation Week and NAIDOC Week and involves tours across South Australia from big-screen cinemas to remote communities, Nunga Screen presents a diverse film program for cinema-goers of all ages.

The 2023 program features the premiere of a second Country Arts SA commissioned short documentary from an emerging First Nations filmmaker. Bookings are essential. <u>Details</u> HERE.

This free community event celebrating First Nations art and culture features a Welcome to Country and dance performance by Petoila Wilson, followed by live music by Ngananyi Lakinyeri and catering by Meez On Plus.

First Nations artists will be in attendance. Some art is available for purchase.

The City of Marion will have a table promoting neighbourhood centres and First Nations neighbourhood centre programs

## Aboriginal Basket Weaving Workshops, Saturday, 8 July, 10 am – 12 pm, Glandore

Tahnae, a Kullilli and Wiradjuri woman, will host weaving workshops at the Glandore Community Centre.

The workshops cost \$10 per person with bookings through Eventbrite.

Participants in Weave New Connections @ Café 25 with Tahnae will learn about weaving techniques taught by Aboriginal Elders and how they traditionally harvested and prepared natural materials.

Raffia will be supplied, but participants are welcome to bring along some material they may like to weave into their creations.

These workshops are suitable for ages 10 and up (plastic needles are used). Participants can attend one workshop or join more to complete their projects.
