# **Consultation Report**

#### Introduction

Landscape architects WAX Design have been engaged by the City of Marion to assist in preparing a concept plan for the Playspace Upgrade project at Sixth Avenue Reserve, Ascot Park.

WAX Design acknowledges that successful play projects are achieved through community inclusion, engagement and consultation processes and that a collaborative design process ensures positive project outcomes for all.

The approach to the project embeds appropriate engagement with the local community, enabling the design team to hear directly from community with regards to their preferences and desired experiences.

The consultation approach focuses on engaging with the community early in the process, with the strong intent of building ownership in the project.

#### What is the Role of this Report?

This report summarises the consultation undertaken to inform the concept development of the playspace.

The information contained within this report will be used by WAX Design to:

- Guide ideas generation and design of the concept plan within the defined service level;
- Test the consultation results within the concept plan to ensure the desired and correct outcomes are achieved

#### What Did We Do?

The City of Marion and WAX Design facilitated a 1 hour targeted consultation session on site at Sixth Avenue Reserve with the local community. The session was aimed at collating information to build upon knowledge of the reserve through an interactive process, encouraging the community to thoughtfully consider their aspirations and ideas. The session also allowed the project team the chance to discuss and test design possibilities with those who participated.

The City of Marion created a questionnaire for residents to complete which was available in both digital and paper formats at the consultation session. The questionnaire was also available for residents to complete online at the Making Marion website

The session comprised of:

Idea Generation:

Posters asking community members, children and parents to place sticky dots on images of preferred items/opportunities/ experiences they would like to see incorporated within the reserve;

Cognitive mapping:

Aerial imagery of the site allowing the community to map issues and opportunities and generally discuss what is important to them in the reserve upgrade;

• Council Survey:

A project specific questionnaire was developed and provided in a digital on-line format and a paper format to gain additional information with regards to the sites issues and opportunities along with play amenity and types of play environments preferred by the community



# **Consultation Summary**

#### Introduction

The following summary breaks down the consultation results into a synopsis of the idea generation, cognitive mapping and council survey that was undertaken during the consultation sessions for Sixth Avenue Reserve, Ascot Park.

An analysis of these results will be explored in the following sections to assist in developing key directions for the concept plan at Sixth Avenue Reserve. For further reference, raw data can be found in the Appendix.

#### Introduction

This neighbourhood reserve is adjacent the local Scout Hall and existing carpark facilities and centrally located between Sixth Avenue and Allison Street.

The existing play equipment requires replacement along with some amenity provision including the shelter and barbecue.

The consultation process focused on the opportunities which could be incorporated into the new playspace, whilst responding to the Scout community use requirements along with those of the broader neighbourhood community.

The consultation also encompassed improved amenity provision opportunities within the service level of a neighbourhood level reserve.

Site Boundary



#### **Idea Generation:**

The community was asked to vote for their top 4 play and amenity choices for the reserve from up to 29 different options using sticky dots. Respondents were categorised into adult male and female; boy and girl children to facilitate an understanding of age and gender choices and overall preference review.

Sliding, imaginative play and water play were considered by children and adults as the top 3 play experiences they would like to see incorporated within Sixth Avenue Reserve Playspace. Boys and girls also had sliding and imaginative play as their top two choices.

Climbing, swinging and nature play were also experiences with strong preferences to be included. (See graph 01)









#### **Cognitive Mapping:**

Using aerial mapping of existing site conditions, issues and opportunities were discussed with the community and their comments, feedback and ideas were recorded on 'post it' notes.

All comments received have been recorded and collated (please refer to Appendix)

The list below is a summary of all comments received on the post it notes, with the number in brackets representing repeated comments to indicate community preferences when asked the question 'What is important to you?';

- Outdoor education (fire pit, tents, rope making, orienteering) = (4)
- Facilitation of scout based activities and amenity provision =(3)
- Flying fox = (3)
- Less bark chip mulch = (2)
- Water pump =(2)
- Monkey bars = (2)
- Wobbly play equipment (surf board/duck) =(2)
- Sand pit =(2)
- Dog facilities = (2)

Provision for gross motor skills development including a flying fox, monkey bars and balance predominated the responses received along with cognitive and creative skills influenced by the Scouts association including water, sand and ropes.

Comments received also highlight a preference for a picnic shelter and barbecue facility. Dog management in proximity to play provision was commented upon along with the need for dog waste management. All abilities provision is also important as several children attending Scouts have special needs.









#### **Council Survey:**

Several key questions were posed to the community through the survey including preferred age range of play provision, social, cognitive, creative and individual play opportunities along with amenity provision within the reserve.


Survey respondents were asked to rate the options available in order of preference from 1-6. We have summarised the top 2 preferences for each choice available in the following tables.









#### **Council Survey:**

A summary of the survey table results indicate the following;

- Playspace target range top preference was between 4-11 years of age with ages 0-3 a close second choice. A broad range of community preference was also indicated with the selection of above 12 years and adult choice representation.
- Preference is for more funds to be spent on play equipment rather than other items.
   However, a picnic table and an irrigated grass area were also popular items.
- Social play highlighted natural shade as first choice followed by seating
- Active play preferences were dominated by swinging and climbing, followed by sliding
- Cognitive and creative play elements top choice was water play closely followed by building and making, natural and music play
- Individual and quiet play top choice was a shelter and then exploring and imaginative play

#### **Council Survey Comments:**

The following list below provides a summary of all the additional comments and suggestions received, with the numbers in the brackets representing repeated comments to indicate community preferences;

- Shade = (6)
- Dog provision=(4)
- Toilets = (4)
- Equipment for younger children = (4)
- Equipment for youth/older kids = (3)
- Access to water/water play = (3)
- Fencing including dogs and children=(3)
- Sand pit = (3)
- Swings = (3)
- Fitness equipment =(2)
- Seating = (2)
- More grass =(2)
- Ball sports =(2)
- CPTED/Lighting = (2)

A broad range of comments were received highlighting amenity requirements of shade, seating and toilet provision along with diverse play experiences from young children to teens, fitness, sports and nature based play.

Dog management in proximity to play provision was commented upon along with the need for dog waste management.

#### **Consultation Analysis**

The consultation synopsis has highlighted the communities preferences for play experiences and amenity to be incorporated within Sixth Avenue Reserve playspace upgrade. It is these consultation outcomes that will underpin the design process and inform design outcomes that will work with the community and council needs.

The concept designs will require a balance of the consultation results within the context of the site to ensure the correct design decisions are made.





# **Key Considerations and Design Directions**

Information provided by the community through the Idea Generation, Cognitive Mapping and Council Survey has been collated and analysed to form the following key considerations and design direction for the Sixth Avenue Reserve Playspace Project;


Each key consideration and design investigation, although noted, will be governed by budgetary and service level requirements.


- Challenging and active play preferences indicate climbing, sliding, swinging and flying (flying fox) were a priority
- Imaginative and creative play opportunities include nature based, sand and water
- Integration of play provision and dog management is required for positive and inclusive community outcomes
- Co-location of the Scouts SA facility strongly influenced outdoor education facilitation including tents, rope making, orienteering and exploring
- Age range provision needs to be broad ranging from toddlers to adults with accessibility a key factor
- Opportunity to reduce the number of formalised entrances to the site and create greater connection to Allison Street
- There is limited existing natural shade, hence additional tree planting required
- Amenity provision needs to reflect desires for replacement of existing shelter, natural shade, seating, picnic table, irrigated turf along with potential removal/replacement of existing barbecue
- Existing carpark is to be retained, separation between play and vehicles will be required
- Existing service provision includes mains water and electricity including a light pole within the playspace
















#### Scouts (Cubs) Idea Generation
















